

# NIENTE ACCORDO ITALO-JUGOSLAVO

### Le Trattative tra l'On. Nitti e Pasio Sarebbero Andate a Monte

Roma, 13 aprile.—Da fonte autorevole si apprende che le trattative riguardo un accordo sulla questione Adriatica tra l'On. Nitti e Pasio, primo ministro

della Jugoslavia, sono andate a monte. Pur tuttavia si spera che al prossimo convegno di San Remo Lloyd George riuscirà a persuadere i rappresentanti jugoslavi ad accordarsi con l'Italia. I giornali si occupano diffusamente dei risultati del viaggio in Italia del cancelliere austriaco Renner ed annunziano che importanti protocolli riguardanti gli interessi economici dei due paesi sono stati firmati e che l'On. Nitti abbia promesso la concessione dell'autonomia all'Alta Adige e al Tirolo Italiano, con la formazione di una Trieta provinciale. Le notizie dei giornali sono confermate da un comunicato ufficiale nel quale è detto che i colloqui tra Nitti e Renner hanno assicurato la concordanza di interessi tra l'Austria e l'Italia ed i rapporti amichevoli tra i due paesi. Un dispaccio da Karachi, India, annuncia in onore del capitano Gorlesco e del Tenente Grassi, due aviatori italiani che avevano preso parte al volo Roma-Tokio. La morte è avvenuta quando l'aeroplano è precipitato da grande altezza sulla costa di Bushire, nel Golfo Persico, in conseguenza di un guasto al motore. La notizia ha profondamente impressionato il Consiglio dei Ministri si è adunato sotto la presidenza dell'On. Nitti e con l'intervento del capo di Stato Maggiore, Generale Badoglio. Lo scopo della riunione è stato quello di discutere urgenti questioni interne e di esaminare il programma dei lavori che saranno svolti alla Conferenza Interalleata di San Remo. Riguardo a detti lavori particolarmente sono state discusse le questioni relative all'assetto dell'Adriatico, alla Turchia, all'Ungheria ed alla Russia. La prima riunione della Conferenza a San Remo avrà luogo il giorno 19 corrente. Alcuni giornali annunziano prossimo l'incontro tra il sovrano di Spagna e Re Vittorio Emanuele. L'incontro avverrebbe in Roma e contribuirebbe un fatto di alta importanza politica.

# INDIANA WOMEN RULED OUT

### Cannot Be Delegates or Candidates and Cannot Vote

Indianapolis, April 13.—(By A. P.)—Women cannot be delegates to state conventions of the political parties and cannot be candidates for county offices, according to interpretations of the Indiana election laws yesterday by the state board of election commissioners. The board had previously ruled that women could not vote at the state primary May 4.
