

Banker and Founder of City Club Is Victim of Heart Disease

Albert E. Turner, banker and civic betterment leader, died suddenly of heart disease in his home at 6435 Woodbine avenue, Overbrook, last night. Mr. Turner had not been well for several months, but insisted on attending to his duties in his office of the Harper & Turner Co., investment brokers, on Saturday.

He remained in bed yesterday, but his condition was not considered serious until shortly before he died, about 10 o'clock.

He is survived by a widow and six

January 22, 1865. He was educated in
public schools and for eight years was public schools and for eight years was engaged as a general secretary and organizer of Young Men's Christian Associations. In 1892 he began newspaper work as a reporter.

Later he was financial editor of the North American, and in 1906 became associated with Edward B.
