

### GET HAPPY LETTER FROM MISS APPLE

Dead Girl's Parents Receive Letter Dated April 3, Written in Cheerful Vein

### SEE SUICIDE DISPROVED

Allentown, Pa., April 21.—Like a vindictive voice from the grave there came a letter yesterday to Mr. and Mrs. Wilson H. Apple from their daughter, Miss Mary Ellen Apple, "Friends" writer, whose body was found Sunday at Versailles, after she had been mysteriously missing for two weeks. The contents of this letter seem absolutely to disprove the story from Paris that Miss Apple was the victim of self-destruction.

Girl friends of Miss Apple indignantly deny that she met death by her own hand. She had no financial or other troubles, least of all a love affair, and if it had been a matter of money her resources would have become virtually limitless by means of a mere cablegram to her father, who is of such standing that he could have sent her five, ten or twenty thousand francs immediately.

The letter that arrived was addressed

to Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Apple, was dated April 3 and says in part: "Dearest Ones: Thank you for all the clippings. We had a very busy time in London, but a very enjoyable one. We left Wellington Wednesday morning. In the evening we all went to the theatre. I bought two more blouses. My new suit is rather light, blue-gray mixture, which makes a nice suit for spring and summer, but now that it is made up I am sorry I did not get a darker material.

"The London office made a mess of our train bookings. I have to wait all by myself two whole days here until Wednesday night. Then I go all by myself on a two-night and one-day trip to Vienna. We will go through Switzerland in the daytime and will see all its lovely scenery.

"My leather coat I have worn very hard all winter, but I must say it is not so standing hard wear very well. I am hoping that I can have it repaired in Vienna. But, otherwise, it has been very satisfactory and much admired, and it is very warm.

"We left Thursday evening. We got to Southampton at 10:30, and there was the most fearful jam. Every one in England seemed to be going to France for

Easter. We could not get berths and had to sit on our suitcases all night during the crossing. Fortunately, it was very calm, so we did not get sick. We got to Paris at 2 o'clock and went to bed until dinner time.

"This morning Alton and I shopped and she had her hair bobbed. She looks awfully well, because her hair is wavy and fluffy and a beautiful burnished gold. \* \* \* I got material for two light summer gowns. I expect to make them myself."

Nothing has as yet been heard from

Paris about sending the body home, according to directions given by the father as soon as the news was cabled it had been found.

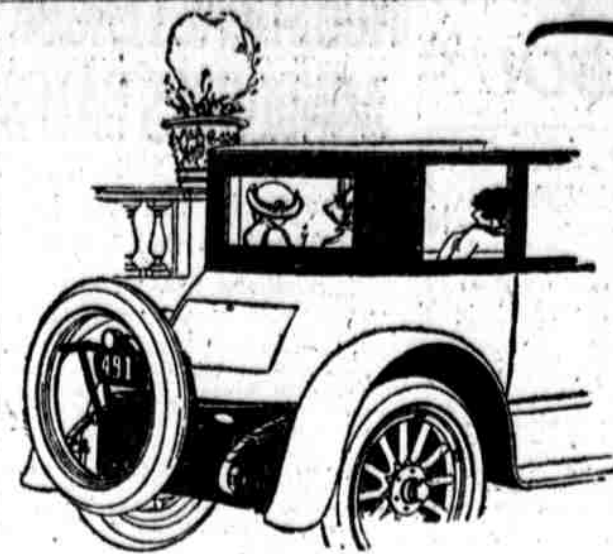
