U. S. G. A. PICKING 'INVADER' GOLFERS

Bob Gardner Tells the Secret That American Amateur Team Being Chosen to Play Abroad

By SANDY McNIBLICK A team of American golf amateurs is being stealthily rounded up by the United States Golf Association to go abroad and play a special international match against the English collegians.

This announcement is authorized by Robert A. Gardner, former national amateur champion. Gardner is going to England next month as a member of the rules of golf committee of the U. S. G. A., and also to play in the British amateur championship at Muirfield.

In discussing the plan with us at Piquelure, Francis Oulmet said that it would be impossible for him to join the team because of his health. Later he said he "never felt better in his life," and later still he won his thirtieth final by annexing the championship of the North and South.

Further pressure is now being brought to bear on the ex-national open and amateur champion, in order to make the team the strongest possible, and it may be that when the bottled sniffs away, Oulmet will be among those present. Chick Evans has been invited, but so far he has not made any definite statement.

Dave Herron's father stated for his son that the hunky champion would not play abroad and would probably enter only the national amateur this year to defend his crown. Neither is Bobby Jones, national finalist, liable to break away from his studies at Georgia Tech to join the invaders.

It is planned to take over a team of ten, and one of considerable strength is sure to sail the seas.

It will be the second meeting between the United States and the Oxford and Cambridge Golfing Society since 1903, when America won, 5 to 4.

Walter J. Travis captained the United States team on that occasion and he had under him in order Eben M. Byers, runner-up to Travis that year in the national, Mr. Brokaw, Bruce D. Smith, L. H. Conklin, Findlay S. Douglas, F. O. Reinhart, H. Chandler Egan and George Ormiston.

Surprise to Most The officials of the governing body have been close-mouthed about the event of the golf invasions of Europe this summer, and this announcement will come as a distinct surprise to the golfing public, which has been led to believe that only the four women, who sailed last Saturday, the professionals and Gardner would play in British tournaments.

According to Gardner, the matches will be played just before the start of the British amateur tournament, which will begin June 7 at Muirfield, Scotland. Undoubtedly they will be scored similarly to the event in this country seventy years ago, a point for winning each thirty-six-hole encounter.

Sheffey Due to Twirl for Red and Blue, Felton for Crimson

Harvard, after dropping a game to the Navy yesterday afternoon, will make its initial appearance of the season on Franklin Field at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Penn is ready to welcome the Crimson invaders, who have had anything but a successful southern trip.

Coch Carius will send Doug Sheffey to the hill against Harvard, holding Herman Harvey in reserve for relief duty, if necessary. Sheffey twirled a great five innings against the Parkers; burg iron team on Tuesday, and is in line fettle for this afternoon's game.

Cook will probably play on the initial sack, although Joe Yates is slated for the post. Alex Wray will covart in right field and Myers in left. The infield will be the same as that used against Parkersburg, with McNichol at second, Shriver at short and Sweeney at third.

Coch Jack Slattery, of Harvard, the former big leaguer, has three veterans, Bullard, Felton and Hardell, to choose from, but Felton is almost certain to draw the assignment. Felton is a Main Line youth living in Haverford. He is rated as a star batsman, and Penn will have its hands full if he is in shape.
