

MURDOCK TO URGE LEGION BONUS PLAN

Pennsylvania State Adjutant Will Meet Western Opposition in Indianapolis Conference

TO PERFECT ORGANIZATION

All state adjutants in various departments of the American Legion throughout the country will confer at Indianapolis tomorrow for the purpose of considering questions of vital importance to the world war veterans' organization.

The legislative program being supported by the Legion before Congress constitutes the most vital issue at present, in view of the diversity of opinion regarding the so-called adjusted compensation.

While State Adjutant William G. Murdock will go from Pennsylvania to exert his influence in behalf of the bonus, there are a large number of states where this issue has not received such cordial support. Some of the western states have taken strong exception to the attitude of the Legion toward the bonus and are exerting every influence against it.

To Perfect Organization

Perfecting of the Legion organization throughout the country will receive consideration at the hands of the various state adjutants. Although the national organization is definitely against the unit post, such posts have been formed in New York. In Philadelphia the unit post idea has been abandoned.

For the membership drive of the Philadelphia county organization, a South Philadelphia rally will be held at the Third Regiment Armory, Broad and Wharton streets tonight, under the auspices of the Young Men's Post No. 70, Post 70, the Musicians, Post 87, Post 196, Joseph S. Ferguson Post No. 333 and the Helen Fairchild Post No. 412, all of the First district. W. W. Melvin, chairman of the First District, will be the presiding officer, and the principal speakers will be Louis L. Tafel, Reginald J. Dugan, Homer H. Hacker and Joseph V. Somers. Music will be furnished by the community service.

streets, the presiding officer being Russell C. Cooney, and the speakers Louis J. Dugan and Homer H. Hacker.

Another rally will be conducted at the Nicetown Boys' Club, Clarissa street and Hunting Park avenue, at which Dr. William E. Haken, of Post 319, will be the presiding officer. Among the speakers are Joseph V. Somers, Courtland Richardson, Henry R. Reinhart and Franklin Spencer Edmonds.

A rally will be conducted by the posts of colored veterans in connection with this rally at 2100 West Columbia avenue, Saturday evening, April 24. The principal speakers will be J. Eugene Heine, Vincent A. Carroll, Frank W. Melvin and Lieutenant Harry G. Milson.

Y. W. C. A. TO SEEK MILLION FUND HERE

Men's Committee Planned to Aid Drive—Mayor Moore Backs Campaign

WILL HELP HOUSE GIRLS

Twenty-five business men of Philadelphia are to be appointed by Mayor Moore as a committee to co-operate with the Young Women's Christian Association

here in a campaign to raise \$1,000,000 from May 4 to May 11.

The Mayor was authorized to name such a committee upon a motion by E. Pusey Passmore, formerly governor of the Federal Reserve Bank, at a meeting yesterday of members of the Y. W. C. A., and business men, who assembled in the Mayor's reception room in City Hall at the invitation of Mr. Moore. The Mayor said he would appoint on the committee men suggested by women of the association.

Mr. Passmore's motion followed an address by Miss Mary E. S. Colt, national campaign director of the Y. W. C. A., who said that in carrying on the campaign for \$1,000,000 in Philadelphia the women must have the assistance of men.

In opening the meeting Mayor Moore said that every employer of girls should be interested in the work of the Y. W. C. A. "for purely business reasons." The community owed it to itself to look after the working girls living in it.

John H. Mason, president of the Commercial Trust Company, said the project of the Y. W. C. A. should be "sold as a business proposition" to employers of girls.

The Y. W. C. A. proposes to devote \$305,000 of the \$1,000,000 to the housing of working girls, which will include the erection of a business women's hotel. A survey recently completed by the association shows that of the 271,778 working girls in the city 38,000 do not live at home. Thirteen organizations which provide for girls are able to house only 678, of which number the Y. W. C. A. accommodates 424, the maximum rent of a room at the Y. W. C. A., \$4, is said to be the minimum outside.
