

Aid for Veterans Is Plan of Legion

Head of Vocational Training Board Will Co-operate With Organization

Posts to Hold Rallies

Dr. L. N. Fuller, chairman of the Board of Vocational Training in Philadelphia, declared today that he proposes to co-operate with the American Legion to obtain for former service men every advantage that can be accorded them under the present laws. The committee on disabled soldiers and medical aid for Philadelphia county has been in conference with Doctor Fuller and will report at the next meeting of the county committee, which will be held in the City Club, 313 South Broad street, May 5.

Dr. W. E. Raiken, the commander of Tioiga Post No. 310, chairman of this committee, announced a satisfactory arrangement has been made with the Board of Vocational Training with a view to obtaining the best possible service for discharged soldiers, sailors and marines in and out of the Legion. This committee also is planning to confer with the officials of the Public Health Service. The committee includes Frank McSloy, Post 68; Dr. Charles Wang, Post 335; Harris W. Watkins, Post 259; Russell C. Eckel, Post 264; William R. Andress, Post 376; Mrs. Ethel Nibley, Post 412. Prince-Forbes, Post 7, will hold a joint membership smoker and rally with Post 20 Tuesday. National emblem and post banner will be dedicated by Judge John M. Patterson, and presentation made of a model boat and trophy cup. The Women's Auxiliary will hold a rummage sale May 7 and 8.

The drive for \$7500 for a memorial building in the Forty-sixth ward, in honor of the men who were killed in the war, will be opened by the J. J. Barry Post No. 83, tonight.

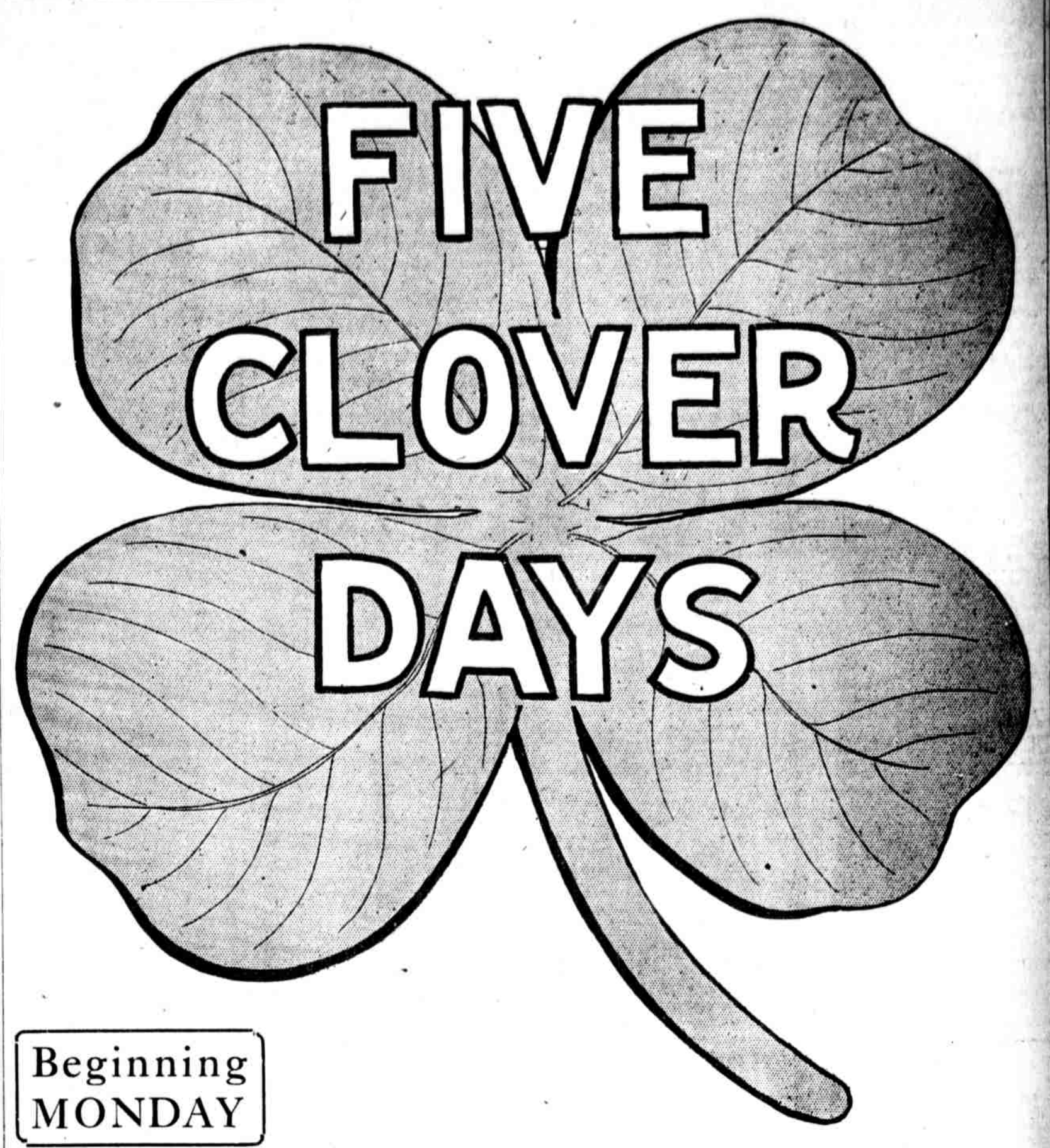
