

LEGION HERE ADDS 10,000 TO ROLLS

Membership Drive Makes Good Progress in the First Week. 25,000 Men Sought

MANY RALLIES ARE PLANNED

Ten thousand members have been added to the rolls of the seventy-eight posts of the American Legion in Philadelphia as a result of the first week of the membership drive, which will continue until May 2.

This estimate was made following a study of the returns from posts throughout the county. It is the hope of the managers of the canvass that in the course of the next seven days 25,000 more former service men and women will be brought under the Legion banner in this city.

Every post is obtaining a list of former service men in its vicinity, and these names are being canvassed. It will be the first time that all eligible veterans of the war have been approached in some sections of the city.

Women Asked to Join

Legionaries will be stationed on all the busy corners of the city next Saturday afternoon to invite into the Legion any former service man or woman who is not wearing the Legion button.

This announcement was made by Thomas F. Meehan, chairman of the membership committee.

Miss Margaret C. Thomas, commander of the Teoman (1) Post 50, and Miss Elizabeth R. Wunderle, the employment officer of this post, have promised to organize a group of canvassers who will go over the city with the Legionaries.

The drive for membership has stimulated the interest of the posts in the matter of paid-up members. The Captain Walter M. Gearty Post, No. 415, has requested each member to bring into the fold one new member at the next meeting. And the commander, David B. Simpson, has announced that all those who are now enrolled and who have not paid their dues will be dropped from the rolls.

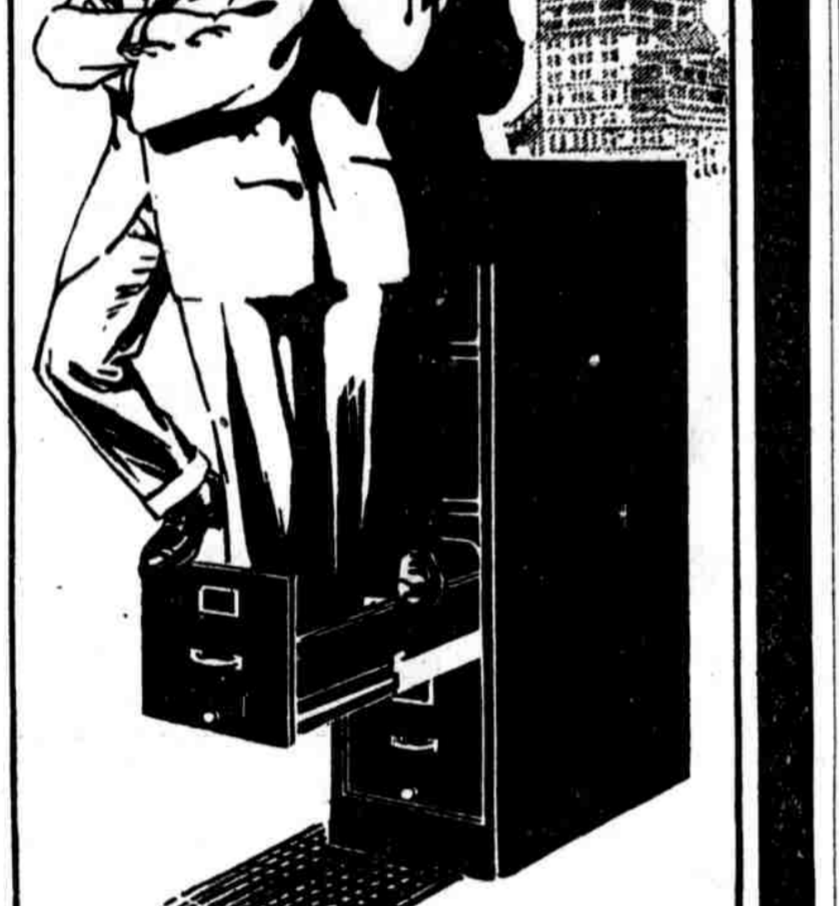
