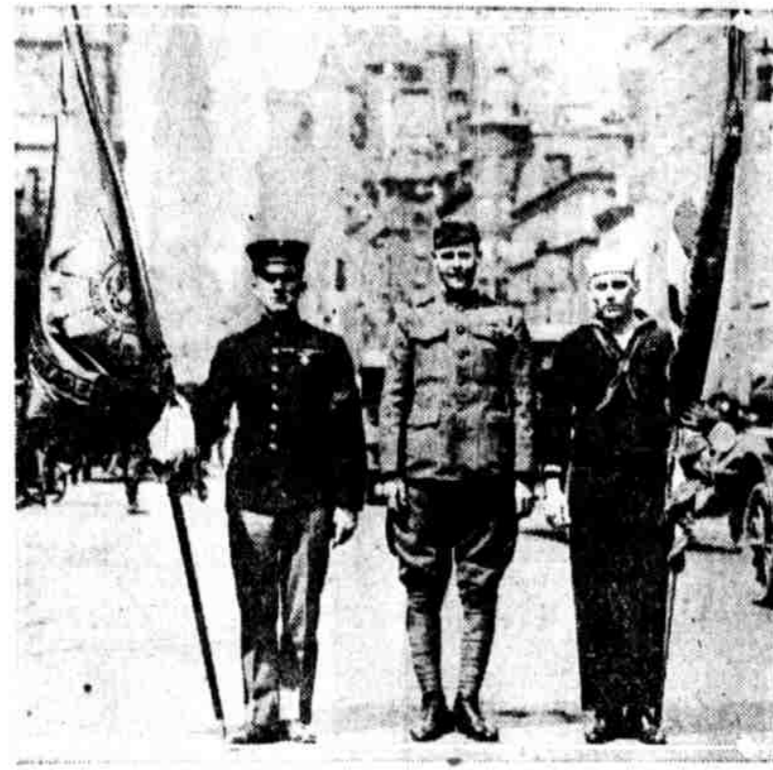

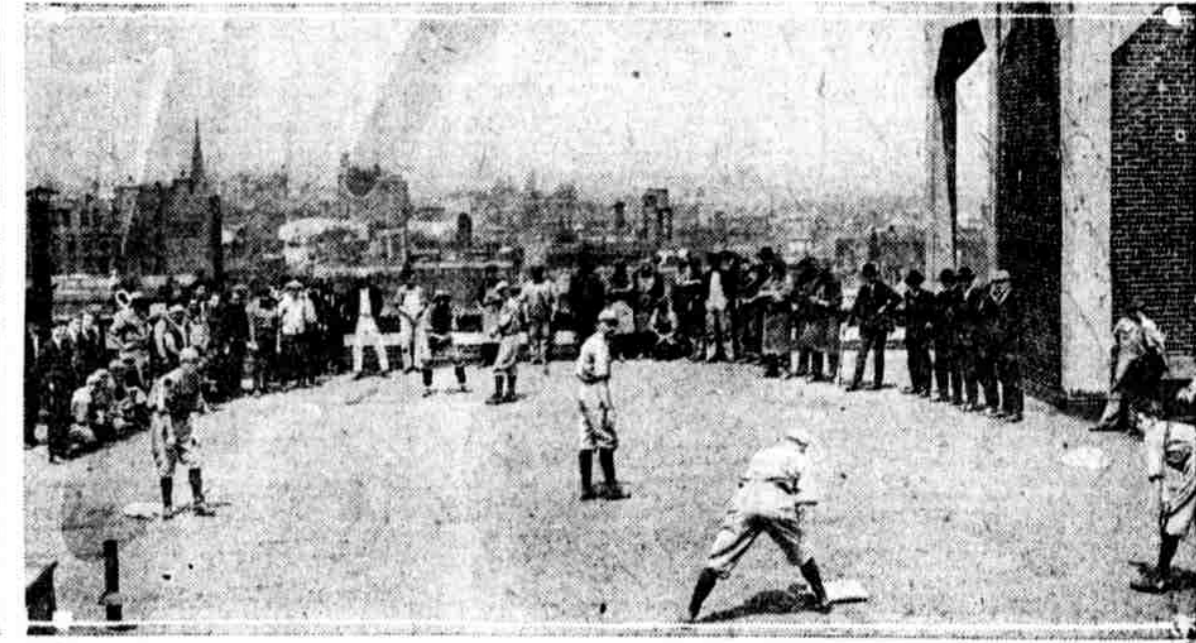
ROBERT BODNEY, 2654 North Fairhill street, plants a tree in front of his home. Frame work will be built around it for protection.



MISS MARY GILROY, who does a mighty fine job at covering first base for the Fleisher Mill ball team. Low throws are easy for her.

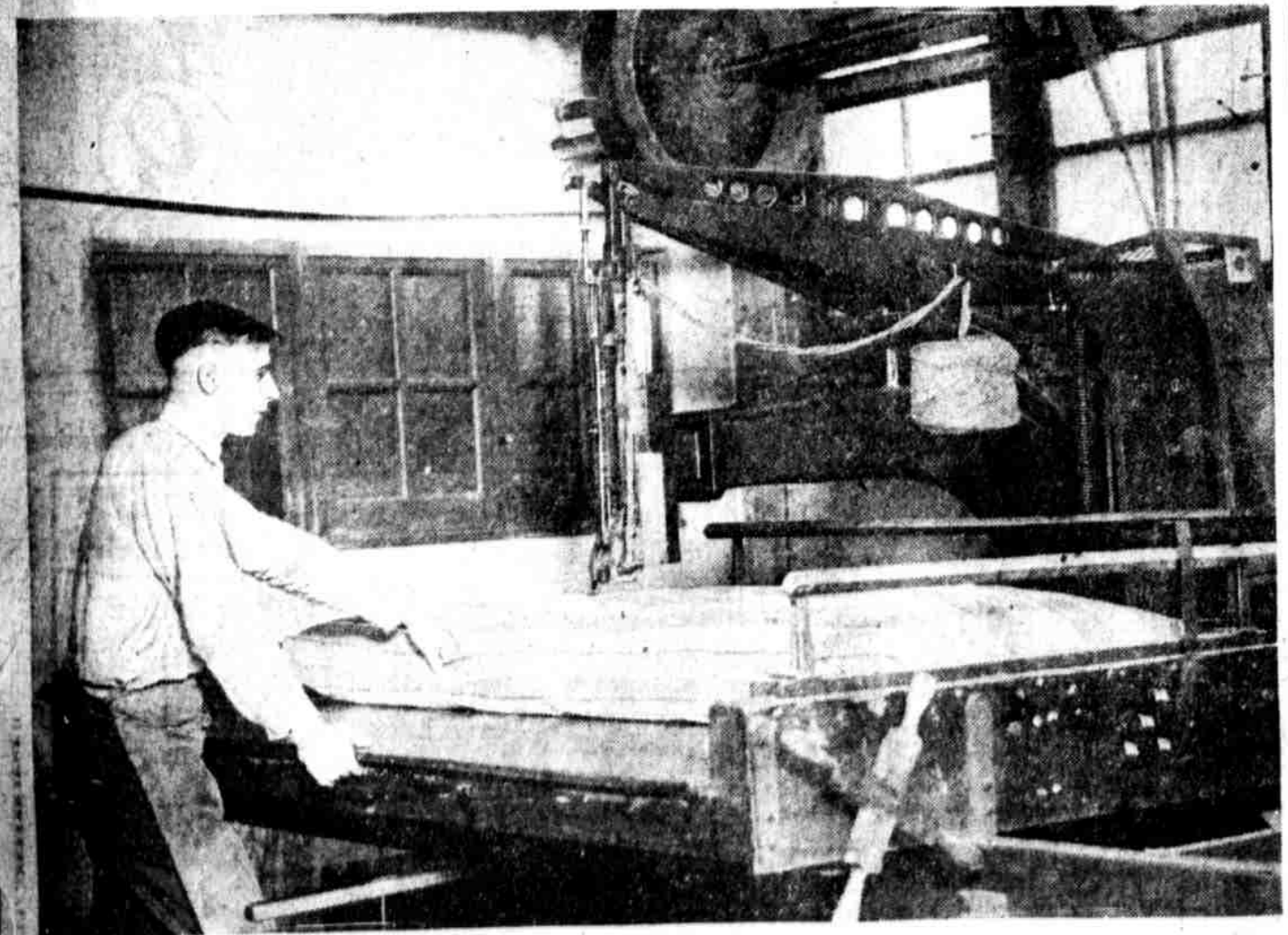


MARGARET McNULTY, one of the real Philadelphia tricycle riders. She lives in the Hunting Park section and is often guilty of "speeding."
