

CREW IS RESCUED AFTER TUG SINKS

Philadelphians Near Death
When Vessel Gives Up Battle
With Atlantic Storm

ENGINE ROOM IS FLOODED

When the good ship Admiral, weighing 700 tons, was on her way from Philadelphia for San Domingo April 23 everything was shipshape aboard, and there was every prospect for an easy passage.

The Admiral now lies at the bottom of the North Atlantic. Her shipwrecked crew are en route for their homes here, after having been saved from the sea.

For the first week all went well, and the little vessel ploughed along under fair skies and fair winds. Last Saturday the sea rose and the wind soon developed into a stiff southwest gale that increased in intensity until the boat began making very heavy weather of it.

So greatly did the tug pitch and roll that her tall smokestack began to give as the starboard star parted. When another stay gave, the smokestack gave a final lurch and fell with a crash, sliding over the side.

The port side of the deckhouse was smashed in by the funnel. Smoke filled the cabins, and to make matters worse, the engine and fireroom doors fought their way to deck through blinding clouds of steam.

Investigation by the chief engineer disclosed that the main steam line had been broken. Steam issued from the broken line with a stony roar. The pressure in the boilers rapidly fell. Soon the engine stopped.

The wind increased and the tug fell into the trough of the sea. Waves

broke over her continually, flooding the cabins through the smashed deckhouse and pouring down into the hold through the opening where the funnel had stood. Every effort was made to keep the tug's head to the wind. Sea anchors were rigged, but with no effect. An attempt was made to get some rafts on the boat, but as fast as a bit of sail was raised upon either mast the wind whipped it into shreds.

Wireless calls for help were sent out, and the crew were given the order to abandon ship. The two lifeboats were launched after great difficulty, and sheltered in the lee of the vessel, escaped destruction. The crew tumbled in and shoved off. Five minutes later the stern of the tug lifted into the air and she sank bow first.

By steady pulling and continuous hauling, the men in the small boats managed to keep them afloat in the heavy seas until a passing vessel picked them up. They were landed at Wilmington, N. C., and are now on their way to this city.
