

SENATORS AGAINST COMMUNIST RULING

Committee Considers Revision of Immigration Laws at Special Meeting

Washington, May 6.—Immediate amendment of the immigration laws was considered today at a special meeting of the Senate immigration committee, called as a result of the ruling yesterday by Secretary Wilson that membership in the Communist Labor party is alone sufficient cause for deportation of aliens.

Chairman Johnson, of the House immigration committee, was the first witness. He criticized Secretary Wilson and Assistant Secretary Post and urged prompt passage of the House bill extending the anti-alien laws. Senator King, of Utah, also denounced the Communist Labor ruling.

"It is apparent from the attitude

of Secretary Wilson and Mr. Post," said Senator King, "that we should transfer deportation powers from the Labor Department to the Department of Justice, particularly if we are to have such men in office as Mr. Wilson and Mr. Post."

Mr. Johnson declared that the Communist Labor party, as well as the Communist party, advocated the overthrow of the government by force. Attorneys for aliens in the Communist Labor case admitted, he said, that there was no difference between the two parties.

"The secretary said that the Communist Labor party advocates use of ballots and secure reforms," said Mr. Johnson. "When they say ballots they mean bullets. We can't temporize with them."

Passage by the Senate of the House bill, the witness continued, is necessary to meet Secretary Wilson's ruling. Existing laws, he declared, are inadequate and would permit planting of a bomb at the base of the Statue of Liberty. Proof of an overt act of touching off the bomb, he said, would be necessary.

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THREE DIE FROM ANTHRAX

Chicago Curled Hair Co. Ordered to Close Factory
Chicago, May 6.—(By A. P.)—Three deaths from anthrax were being investigated today by Health Commissioner Robertson, following discovery that all three victims were employees of the Chicago Curled Hair Co., manufacturers of automobile cushion stuffing. The factory of the company was ordered closed pending investigation whether the anthrax germ was imported in raw hair.
