

# ANARCHY SPREADS IN NORTHERN ITALY

**Mob Seizes General and Sets Fire to His Motorcar—Two Slain, Thirty Hurt**

## NITTI AVERTS TEST VOTE

 Rome, May 7.—While reports of radical uprisings in northern Italy were being received, attempts to bring about a vote which might result in the fall of Premier Nitti's cabinet were made in the Chamber of Deputies here yesterday. The premier frustrated them by declaring he would not consider any such vote as implying lack of confidence in the government.

Anarchists have gained the upper hand in several districts and disorders have occurred, especially in Leghorn, where the extremists invaded the Chamber of Labor and committed acts of violence.

Police and military forces were compelled to interfere and in the melee two persons were killed and more than thirty wounded.

Railway men have refused to allow a train to leave Bologna until 500 carabinieri on their way to Viareggio were taken from the cars.

The strike of peasants in the lower districts of the province of Verona is becoming grave, owing to the violent measures taken by strikers. Peasants who refuse to join in the strike are reported to have been shot and strikers are accused of starving cattle and threatening death to proprietors.

Six thousand strikers are alleged to have invaded fields, setting fire to standing crops, and spreading terror among the inhabitants, who already are suffering from lack of food.

Governmental authorities are taking energetic steps and are dispatching troops with machine guns to all danger points.

General Castellazzo, who was sent to Viareggio by the government when the strike situation there became serious, was placed under virtual arrest upon his arrival, and his automobile was burned by a mob, says the Tribune.

When the general reached the city limits he found the road blocked by a crowd. His machine stopped and it was immediately surrounded by a mob, which forced the passengers to alight and took possession of the car. General Castellazzo protested against this, especially when he learned it was planned to burn the machine.

Signor Salvatore, socialist deputy, appeared at the moment, however, and said to have advised the general to "let the crowd work its will on that car, as the government will replace it." While they were talking the car was set on fire.

General Castellazzo, accompanied the deputy to the chamber of labor, where the former was dismissed and permitted to leave.

## SIR HAMAR RE-ELECTED

Chief Secretary for Ireland Returned to Parliament

Sunderland, Eng., May 7.—(By A. P.)—Sir Hamar Greenwood, chief secretary for Ireland, was re-elected to Parliament today in the by-election necessitated by his recent appointment to the Irish secretaryship. Sir Hamar received 22,813 votes as against 14,370 for V. H. Rutherford, the Labor candidate, and 5,065 for W. Howe, Independent Liberal.

At the general election in 1918 Sir Hamar, a coalition liberal, was returned by about 2000 plurality over R. M. Hudson, the Unionist candidate. The Labor candidate in this election polled 9578 votes. No Unionist opposed him in the present by-election.

## German Election in August

London, May 7.—(By A. P.)—Germany's presidential election, probably will be held late in August, according to a Berlin dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. The Deutsche Zeitung is quoted as saying President Ebert will not seek re-election.

## LEONIDA BISSOLATI DIES

Socialist Leader in Italian Chamber Was Active Patriot

Fiume, May 7.—(By A. P.)—Leonida Bissolati-Bergamaschi, Socialist member of the Chamber of Deputies, died yesterday. Some time ago he underwent an operation and recently was stricken with pneumonia.

Signor Bissolati-Bergamaschi, who was the leader of the Reform Socialists for many years, had been a prominent figure in Italian politics. He was always violently patriotic and worked for many years for a united and prosperous Italy. He was fifty-eight years old.

During the late war, being an ardent Alpine climber, he joined the army as a sergeant of the Alpini troops and was wounded in one of the mountain encounters with the Austrians. For his brave conduct as a soldier he was awarded the silver medal of the army. Bissolati-Bergamaschi twice held ministerial positions, having been minister without portfolio and minister of militia, aid and war pensions.

# CARRANZISTAS AIM BLOW AT GONZALES

**General Murguia Leads Mexican Federal Forces Into State of Puebla**

## REBELS ATTACK TRAIN

Washington, May 7.—General Murguia has been sent into the state of Puebla to attack the forces of General Pablo Gonzales and an engagement already has occurred between the vanguard of the Carranzista troops and the rebels at Otumba, between Mexico City and the city of Puebla.

Authoritative advices reaching Wash-

ington today said Gonzales had declared that he was not in league with the Carranzistas and would resist them by force of arms. This was regarded as complicating the situation in Mexico. Gonzales has declared martial law in Puebla City, according to these advices, and has exacted a loan of 200,000 pesos from the population.

Passenger traffic between Mexico City and Guadalupe has been suspended. A passenger train on this line was attacked by rebels at Penjamo, on May 5, and robbed of a considerable sum of government funds, intended to be used in paying the soldiers at Guadalupe, where at last advices, General Dieguez had 8000 men in his command. Increased rebel activity is reported in the vicinity of era Cruz, where President Carranza's son-in-law, General Candido Aguilar, is in command of the federal troops.

The State Department today had no

confirmation of a private message received here after last midnight from Mexico City via Laredo that Carranza had left the Mexican capital for era Cruz. The private advices said the president left Mexico City last night accompanied by a guard of troops under General Aguilar.

Official advices from the American embassy at Mexico City said E. F. Greenlaw, the American, and his son, who were killed last Saturday near Mexico City, were robbed at the same time of a part of the company payroll, amounting to 4500 pesos.

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## Carpenters' Strike

The Brotherhood of Carpenters of Philadelphia called out all its members on strike May 1. The result has been a complete tie-up of all building construction in Philadelphia and the vicinity.

The Union representatives demanded \$1.25 an hour and a 40-hour or 5-day week.

After a series of conferences extended over 5 months the Master Carpenters and Builders offered as a compromise \$1.12½ an hour and a 44-hour week, an increase of \$1.30 a week over the last rate of pay.

The Union demands, if granted, would increase the pay \$19.50 a week and decrease production 10 per cent.

The increase in carpenters' wages since 1913, based upon our offers, is 125 per cent. For the same period the increased cost of living, according to Government statistics, is only 96.7 per cent.

For the last three years there have been continuous demands for wage increases in every branch of the building industry, which, owing to unusual conditions, have been granted. These demands have increased to such an extent that we have been compelled to make a stand in the interest of the owner, the investor and the home builder more than in our own, as they will be the ones who will ultimately bear the increase.
