SOCIALISTS URGE WEALTH BE DIVIDED

Demand Redemption From Control of Private Interests for Benefit of All

By the Associated Press

New York, May 12.—Public administration of the country wealth for the equal benefit of all, was adopted as the first of its declaration of principles by the national convention of the Socialist party of America here today.

This action emphasized the victory of the "conservative" party forces yesterday over the Illinois delegation "red flag" demands that the "dictatorship of the proletariat" and limitation of citizenship to workers. The primary principle adopted reads:

"The Socialist party of the United States demands that the control and its wealth be redeemed from the control of private interests and turned over to the people to be administered for the equal benefit of all.

The committee of five appointed to present to President Wilson, through Secretary Tumulty, a petition asking an amnesty for all political prisoners will be received at the White House Saturday afternoon, according to a telegram from Mr. Tumulty received at the convention hall today.

A telegram from Secretary of War Baker stated it would be impossible for him to meet the convention's committee next Friday in Washington to hear their appeal for release of all conscientious objectors, but that he would meet the committee Monday.

BRANDEIS IS ELIMINATED

British Mandate for Palestine Makes Him Ineligible as High Commissioner

London, May 12.—(By A. P.)—Prior to the granting to Great Britain of the mandate for Palestine, Louis R. Brandeis, associate justice of the Supreme Court of the United States, and the Right Hon. Herbert J. Samuel, former secretary of the state for home affairs, were most favored for the post of high commissioner, according to information received by the Associated Press.

But Great Britain having been made the mandatory power virtually eliminated consideration of the American jurist and an official announcement of the appointment of Mr. Samuel is regarded as assured within a few days.

Mr. Samuel recently returned from a three month tour of Palestine. Since his return to England from Palestine Mr. Samuel has expressed the belief that a large majority of the Arabs are not unfavorably disposed toward the British, and said the Jews deprecated the suggestions that the recent troubles in Jerusalem were directed against the British.

A romantic sidelight to Mr. Samuel's prospective appointment as high commissioner to Palestine is the engagement of his son Edwin to Hadassah Gratzovsky, of Jafa, whom he met while serving a Heaton in a British regiment in Palestine.

HOWELLS FUNERAL HELD

Throng Pays Last Tribute to Emigrant American Writer

New York, May 12.—(By A. P.)—Funeral services for William Dean Howells, distinguished novelist and editor in the Church of the Ascension, in Fifth avenue today, drew a throng of friends and admirers, among whom were many of the foremost figures in American literary life.

In accordance with Mr. Howells' request, the Rev. Dr. Percy Stickney Grant, a life-long friend, was selected to have charge of the simple services. The body will be cremated and the ashes taken to Cambridge, Mass.

No eulogy was delivered, Doctor Grant explaining this was the wish of the novelist.

Explicitly marked his life, and he wished to have simplicity mark his departure from this world," said the clergyman.

"Simplicity was a religion with him. He was brought up on the philosophy of Swedenborg and in spite of the realism he was noted for, he had some of the spirit of this great mystic. It would be futile for me to try and add to what has been said by others in honor of this eminent author and great man."

MINORITY RECOGNIZED

Revision Commission Would Let Assembly Fix Quotas for Cities

Harrisburg, Pa., May 12.—(Proportional representation was given recognition today by the commission on constitutional amendments and revision in the adoption of a section which makes it optional on the part of the Legislature to prescribe the system for municipalities.

An amendment for state-wide proportional representation was defeated by the commission last night, after considerable debate. The debate on the section for municipalities lasted more than an hour.

The section adopted was suggested by C. G. Hoag, of Philadelphia, secretary of the American Proportional Representation League, and provides for either a general Assembly may prescribe proportional representation for the election of any representative body in all municipalities of a given class or classes, or in every municipality, or by a vote of its electors approves proportional representation for those elections.

TRY TO TRACE USE OF PHONE REVENUES

Bell Official Admits Large Payments to American Telephone and Telegraph Co.

Harrisburg, May 12.—Council for the complainants against the rate increases charged by the Bell Telephone Co. into the relations between the Bell and the American Telephone and Telegraph Co. at the hearing today before the Public Service Commission.

One of the contentions of the complainants has been that of the Telegraph and Telephone Co. gets the largest portion of the Bell company's revenues.

C. W. Hazard, chief accountant for the Bell, was on the witness stand showing the upward trend of the company's payroll. He said the average wages on April 1, this year, were 33 per cent higher than January 1, 1919. He declared the Bell company estimated that it would require this year \$11,881,000 for needed construction and of this sum \$8,802,000 is available from the company's reserve.

C. K. Robinson, chief counsel for the complainants, asked Hazard the total amount of toll or long distance money collected by the company last year. Hazard said it amounted to \$6,052,543.96, of which \$4,329,225 was received from service over the lines of the Telegraph and Telephone Co.

In addition to this the witness said the Bell paid to the Telegraph and Telephone Co. \$1,132,443 as license revenues that included rentals and engineering advice. He could not state the total revenue paid to the American Co. by the Bell on business that originated within the state, he said.

Robinson developed during the cross-examination that the Bell has investments totaling \$10,000,000 in telephone companies in Virginia, West Virginia and Delaware and that the revenue from these sources last year amounted to \$253,396. He also drew out that \$100,000 was set aside each year for the sinking fund when the company has a surplus and which is made up otherwise when there was no surplus.

Hitchcock to Attack Republican Resolution Today

Miss Hyman and Bunch were arrested Monday as the result of a long investigation which followed the death of Mr. and Mrs. Bunch last summer at Lincoln Center, Kan. A charge of murder will be placed against them, Mr. Healy said.
