## 14 NEW BISHOPS, METHODIST PLAN

Three Others Now Serving as Missionary Leaders Will Be Elevated

### TO EXTEND FOREIGN WORK

Des Moines, Ia., May 13.—Election of fourteen new bishops was called for in the report of the committee on episcopacy presented today to the Methodist Episcopal conference. In addition three men at present missionary bishops will be raised to the full general superintendency, making seventeen in all—the largest number ever balloted upon.

The report recommends seven new residences, Indianapolis, Shanghai, Calcutta, Singapore, Mexico City, Paris and Copenhagen. In addition there are also seven bishops to be elected to fill existing vacancies. Those in the United States to be filled are at Portland, Ore.; Helena, Mont., and Pittsburgh. Those abroad are Pekin, Manila, Bangalore, India and Monrovia, Liberia.

The seat of one episcopal area is recommended to be changed in Africa. Up to this time it has been at Unstall, Rhodesia, and Cape Town, South Africa, is proposed now.

If the report of the committee is adopted it will mean that additions will be made in the foreign field as follows: China, three bishops instead of two; Southern Asia, four bishops instead of two; Latin America and South America, two bishops instead of one; Europe, three bishops instead of one.

The three missionary bishops who will be raised to bishops are Frank W. Warren, of Lucknow, India; John W. Robinson, of Bombay, India; and Eben S. Johnson, of Africa.

“It is of the utmost importance,” he said, “that a status of peace be accomplished. Not only is it necessary to the industries of this country and its trade, but it is important that the war powers of the President should cease.”

He declared that President Wilson has made ratification impossible and that the peace resolution offers the only way to restore normal conditions.

“The President has iterated and reiterated his determination that the Senate abdicate its functions and accept the treaty exactly as it was presented to this country through foreign powers,” Senator Kellogg continued. “The issue is thus reached, shall we adopt the league and the treaty, imperiling American interests at the behest of the executive, or shall we adopt the treaty with reservations, protecting American rights, American interests and American aspirations?”

Mr. Kellogg expressed confidence in the effectiveness of the resolution to accomplish its ends.

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## KELLOGG SUPPORTS PEACE RESOLUTION

“Mild Reservationist” Believes It Only Way to Restore Normal Conditions

### SCORES WILSON'S POLICY

Washington, May 13.—A status of peace must be obtained “in some other way” if it cannot be secured by ratification of the treaty and the League of Nations, Senator Kellogg, one of the original “mild reservationist” Republicans, declared today in the Senate, supporting the Republican peace resolution.

“It is of the utmost importance,” he said, “that a status of peace be accomplished. Not only is it necessary to the industries of this country and its trade, but it is important that the war powers of the President should cease.”

He declared that President Wilson has made ratification impossible and that the peace resolution offers the only way to restore normal conditions.

“The President has iterated and reiterated his determination that the Senate abdicate its functions and accept the treaty exactly as it was presented to this country through foreign powers,” Senator Kellogg continued. “The issue is thus reached, shall we adopt the league and the treaty, imperiling American interests at the behest of the executive, or shall we adopt the treaty with reservations, protecting American rights, American interests and American aspirations?”

Mr. Kellogg expressed confidence in the effectiveness of the resolution to accomplish its ends.

“While Congress cannot negotiate a treaty, it can, in my judgment, end a state of war which it has created,” he said, “and if agreed to or acquiesced in by the foreign country, diplomatic relations may be restored and a state of peace will exist without the formal negotiation or ratification of a treaty. It seems to me incomprehensible that if the President, having no power to end war, should refuse to enter into a treaty, a state of war must continue until the President is disposed to enter into negotiations.”

Army Beef Sales to End  
Washington, May 13.—(By A. P.)—The army surplus beef probably will be exhausted through sales to the public by the end of this week. Since April 13 daily sales have averaged 300,000 pounds, the price having been maintained at ten and one-half cents per pound.
