

LEGION IN STATE TO HAVE NEW HEAD

George F. Tyler Will Not Seek Re-election Against Any Western Pennsylvanian

ESTIMATES ON DELEGATES

The American Legion in Pennsylvania will elect a new department commander at the second annual convention at Allentown, June 18 and 19. George F. Tyler will not seek re-election.

Incipient candidates are springing up in various parts of the state. It is assumed that the office will not again come to Philadelphia, since Mr. Tyler, who lives in Montgomery county, has held it since organization in this state more than a year ago. It will undoubtedly go to western Pennsylvania.

General Albert J. Logan, of Pittsburgh, Pa., brigadier general in the N. G. T., who was prominent at the first convention, is being prominently mentioned for commander.

Brigadier General William G. Price, of Chester, Pa., commander of the fifty-eighth Artillery Brigade, Twenty-eighth Division, is also being mentioned.

Lieutenant Henry H. Houston Post, of Germantown, has reached a membership of 750, which will give it eight delegates in the state convention. This will be the largest representation from the city. The next largest will be for Henry Post, with fifteen delegates each, David W. Jameson Post and Prince-Forbes Post No. 7 will have four delegates according to present indications.

The All-Navy Post and Walter M. lead in Philadelphia for a long time, but with the advance in dues its membership fell off. Still it has 400 members and will have five delegates.

Raymond E. Greeley Post 61, at its last meeting, decided to hold regular meetings Tuesday evening of every week, instead of the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. The Ladies' Auxiliary of Post 61 recently conducted a rummage sale for the benefit of the post.

BLIND VIOLINIST PLAYS

Abraham Haitowitz Gives Interesting Recital at Witherpoon Hall

Abraham Haitowitz, a blind violinist, gave an interesting recital in Witherpoon Hall last evening before a fair-sized audience. Considering the tremendous handicap under which he has labored, Mr. Haitowitz has accomplished much, although there is in his playing that sense of strain which is always apparent in a performer suffering from an almost insurmountable physical disability.

He opened his program with the Wieniawski concerto in D and followed it with the tremendously difficult and intellectually exacting G minor sonata for violin alone by Sebastian Bach. In neither of them did Mr. Haitowitz rise to the possibilities of the composition, especially in the Bach number, in which in addition his memory was at fault several times.

The soloist was far more happy in the two groups of smaller pieces which followed. These included the slow movement from the Tchaikovsky concerto, a Chopin-Kreisler mazurka and pieces by Sarasate, Brahms, Pergament and Paganini-Auer.

Mr. Haitowitz's greatest asset is in a warm tone of fair power, which in playing has both sincerity and temperance. Many passages were very beautiful. His merit.
