PENN HAS BULGE IN TRACK MEET TODAY

Ouaker Runners Favorites | Many Track-and-Field by Slight Margin Over Cornell Athletes in Annual Battle

Franklin Field, May 15 .- Twitching impatiently as a race horse canters and side-steps up to the barrier, the athletes of Pennsylvania and Cornell warmed up in short sprints and jaunts along the cinder path and on the grass for their annual dual track and field meet here this afternoon.

The weather was not exactly ideal for track sports, for although the sun looked down from clear skies there was too much of the chill of early spring in the air to warm up the athletes to their best efforts. Runners need a hot sun limber up their muscles to best ad-

vantage. The heats of the 100-yard dash were the first events on the program and when the dash men crouched under the gun there were several hundreds of spectators in the stands. Packed in three sections in the south stands were Packed in the Penn students and long before the start of the meet their cheers could be the advantage in the distance runs. heard for blocks around. Ithacans. The Quaker athletes trimmed Dart mouth by a wide margin last Saturday, which boosted their stock to war-baby quotations. Cornell is no weakling; the Ithacans are far stronger than Dartmouth and a very probable inter-collegiate champion, but regardless of these facts Penn is given a slight edge.
Coach Moakley's ruppers have been
masters of the track and field domain so long that track and Cornell almost are synonymous. They have ruled the field of the spiked shoes ever since a quintet of Penn's sons copped the champienship back in 1913.

Cornell is rich in track traditions and, from advance notices, the 1920 team is not below the standard. Cornell is a team to be feared. So is Penn.

Among the Cornell athletes are two intercollegiate titleholders. Karl Mayer and Walker Smith, both of whom wear two crowns. Mayer is the modern Ted Meredith, that is, he resembles the peer-less Ted in that last year he won both the quarter and half-mile titles; Smith took first in the low and high burdles in the 1919 intercollegiates.
