

**DECLARES UNREST DUE TO GOUGERS**  
**ASKS CHECK ON PROFITEERS**

Senator Walsh, of Massachusetts, puts responsibility on Congress

 Washington, May 18.—Profiteering was denounced today in the Senate by Senator Walsh, Democrat, of Massachusetts, who asserted that extortionate prices of profiteers are the principal cause of widespread unrest and that Congress should check them by passing legislation to relieve the situation.

Senator Walsh cited many large dividends, including stock dividends, paid recently by big corporations, and declared the public outcry against the high cost of living were an acute political problem.

Democratic leadership and majorities in Congress, the Massachusetts senator said, are responsible for failure to enact anti-profiteering legislation. The Republicans, he added, cannot shift the responsibility to the President or department heads.

Recommendations made by Senator Walsh to check profiteering were:

Senatorial investigation of income tax returns to disclose individual profiteers.

Passage of several pending bills, including the McKay regulation measure, the McNary bill to stamp out price gouging, the cold storage regulation bill and others.

"I further recommend," said Senator Walsh, "that Congress promptly inaugurate public trading on a large scale unless exorbitant profits are voluntarily and materially reduced at once. In other words, I recommend government competition as an available remedy."

Recommendations not embodied in pending legislation were included in a bill introduced today by Senator Walsh proposing investigation by a special Senate committee of the "relations between high prices for necessities and the concentration of wealth." The measure also would request the President to authorize inspection of corporate and partnership income tax returns.

Among the instances of cooperation profits to disclose individual profiteers were those of the "big five" packers as reported by the Federal Trade Commission, the American Woolen Co., and several textile mills, steel companies, coal operators and newsprint manufacturers.

Discussing whether the Republican and Democratic parties are to fail the people, Mr. Walsh asked: "Shall they be forced to enroll in the Socialist party or to organize a third party which shall offer a candidate whose public record typifies opposition to profiteering and a platform which promises specific measures of relief?"

**Society Magazine Editor and Boudoir Car Inventor Dies at 81**

Morrisstown, N. J., May 18.—Colonel William D'Alton Mann, editor of Town Topics, died at his home here late yesterday from complications following an attack of influenza which he contracted last October. He was eighty-one years old. He is survived by his wife and a daughter, Mrs. Elizabeth Mann Payne.

Mr. Mann was born in Sandusky, O., and was educated as a civil engineer. Upon the outbreak of the Civil War he entered the Union army as a captain and subsequently organized and commanded the Seventh Michigan Cavalry with the rank of colonel. He owned the Mobile Register for a long time and served as a congressional representative from Alabama. He also founded the Smart Set magazine.

The funeral services will be conducted at 11 o'clock tomorrow morning in the Church of the Heavenly Rest, New York. Burial will be in Woodlawn Cemetery.

Colonel Mann invented the boudoir car in 1871. Immediately after the success of his invention was assured in America he introduced it in Europe and founded the Compagnie Internationale des Wagons-Lits, which today operates the de luxe sleeping and dining cars on the transcontinental routes.

**BOY OF 8 CHESS MARVEL**

Little Poland Defeats 20 Adult Experts at Paris

Paris, May 18.—(By A. P.)—Samuel Rzeszewski, a little Poland, eight years old, who has won fame as a chess marvel, justified reports of his ability on Sunday by defeating twenty elderly experts of the Palais Royal Chess Club in a simultaneous tournament. The tournament lasted three hours and the little fellow presented an unusual appearance as he trotted about the tables, which were almost as tall as he. Samuel has been playing chess three years.

**STABBED IN MAKING ARREST**

Constable Wounded With Pitchfork While Executing Warrant

Reading, Pa., May 18.—Constable Malbon Lanner, of Birdsboro, was seriously injured while making an arrest last evening, but succeeded in bringing his man to jail after being stabbed through the left hand and leg with a pitchfork.

Lanner captured Ralph Emery, of Pottstown, and the latter is now in Berks county prison, charged with assault and battery with intent to kill, larceny and resisting an officer. Emery made his attack when the officer was about to arrest him near Birdsboro.

Mrs. Mary Moore, the police matron at City Hall, received a cablegram from Bordeaux, France, last night, announcing the arrival of a granddaughter. Her son, William Campbell Moore, married in France with the A. E. F. He brought his bride to America, but she preferred her home country and he has been working as a contractor in Bordeaux.

**LEVI P. MORTON'S FUNERAL**

Bishop Burch, of New York, to Conduct Services Tomorrow

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., May 18.—Bishop Charles Summer Burch, of New York, will conduct the funeral services tomorrow at 12:15 o'clock over the body of Levi P. Morton, once vice president of the United States, who died at his summer estate, Ellerslie, near Rhinecliff, Sunday evening on his ninety-sixth birthday.

Bishop Burch will be assisted by Dean Howard Robbins, of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, New York, and by the Rev. Francis Little, of the Church of the Messiah, Rhinebeck, where the services will be held. Burial will be in the Morton family plot in Rhinebeck Cemetery.
