

L'ON. NITTI AVREBBE RISOLTO LA CRISI?

L'Annuncio Della Formazione del Nuovo Gabinetto Verrebbe Dato Domani Giovedì

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Roma, 19 maggio.—Si attende che l'On. Nitti annunzi per domani, giovedì, la formazione del nuovo Ministero e si crede che l'On. Vittorio Scialoja rimanga al suo posto come Ministro per gli Affari Esteri.

Roma, 18 maggio.—L'incarico nuovamente dato all'On. Nitti per la for-

mazione del nuovo Gabinetto lascia adito a credere che la soluzione della crisi non rappresenterà altro che un profondo rifacimento ministeriale. Secondo le voci che corrono il nuovo gabinetto si baserebbe sul quadrupio Nitti-Luzatti-Bonomi-Meda. Nulla di concreto si può dire riguardo ai giulliniani che parteciperebbero al nuovo Ministero. I più probabili per il portafoglio sarebbero Panno e De Nicola. Circa i radicali si fa il nome di Fera. In quanto ai cattolici, oltre a Meda, entrerebbero a far parte del nuovo Gabinetto gli onorevoli Micheli, Bertini e Rodino. Sempre stando alle voci che corrono nei circoli parlamentari, l'On. Meda assumerebbe il portafoglio della Grazia e Giustizia, mentre l'On. Bertini quello dell'Istruzione Pubblica. Le mire del partito popolare, ossia cattolico, verrebbero così soddisfatte, poiché il partito cattolico vuole associare le questioni relative al Culto e l'assicurazione che dalle scuole non venga esclusa l'istruzione religiosa. Secondo quanto pubblica il giornale "Il Secolo" il Vaticano si sarebbe pronunciato in favore della combinazione Nitti ed avrebbe impartito istruzioni ai deputati cattolici di accordare tutto il loro appoggio.
