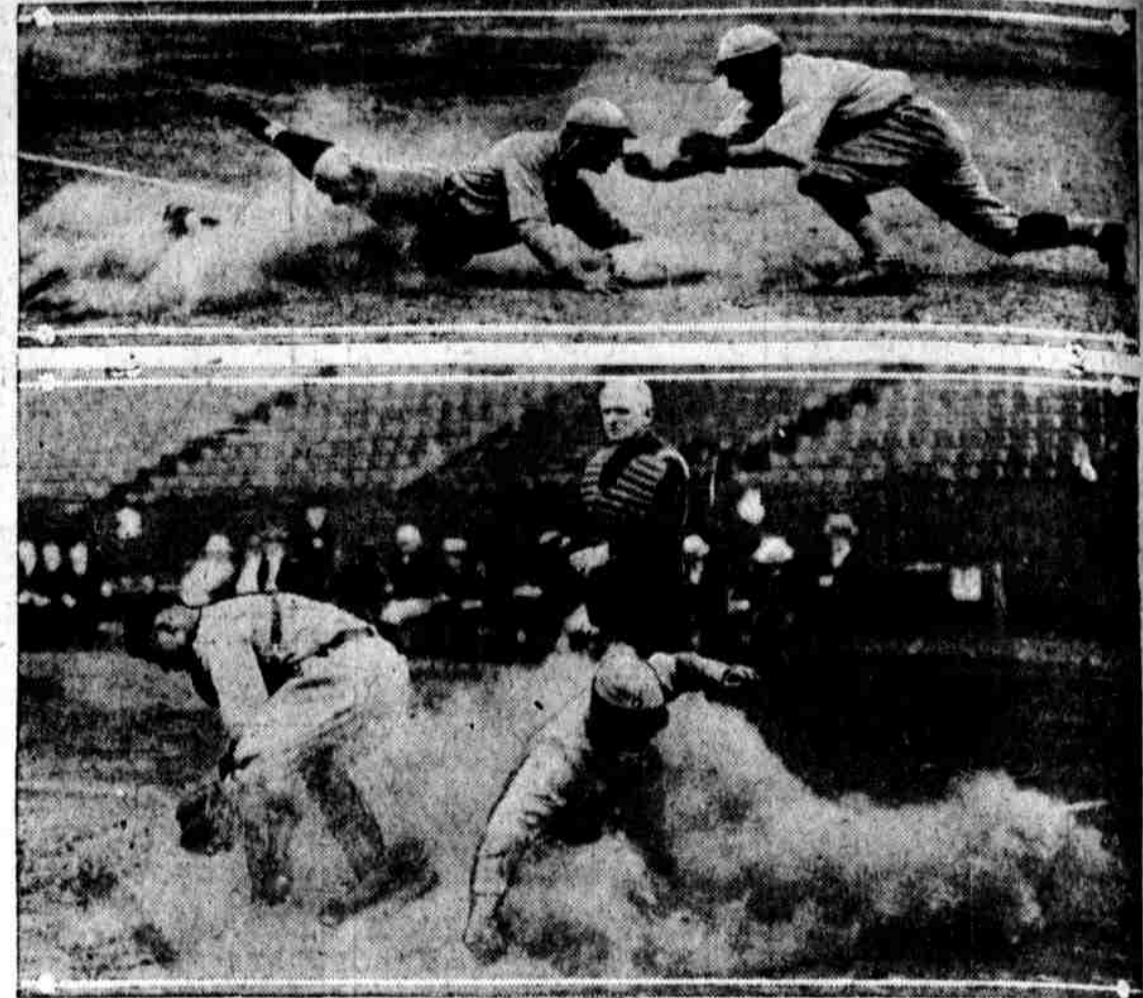




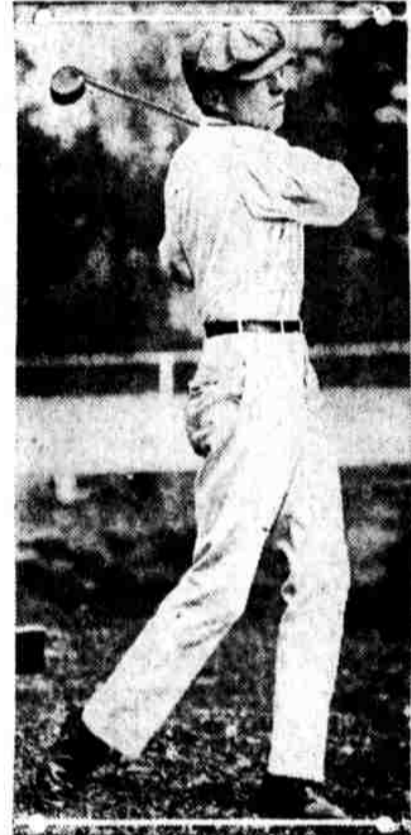

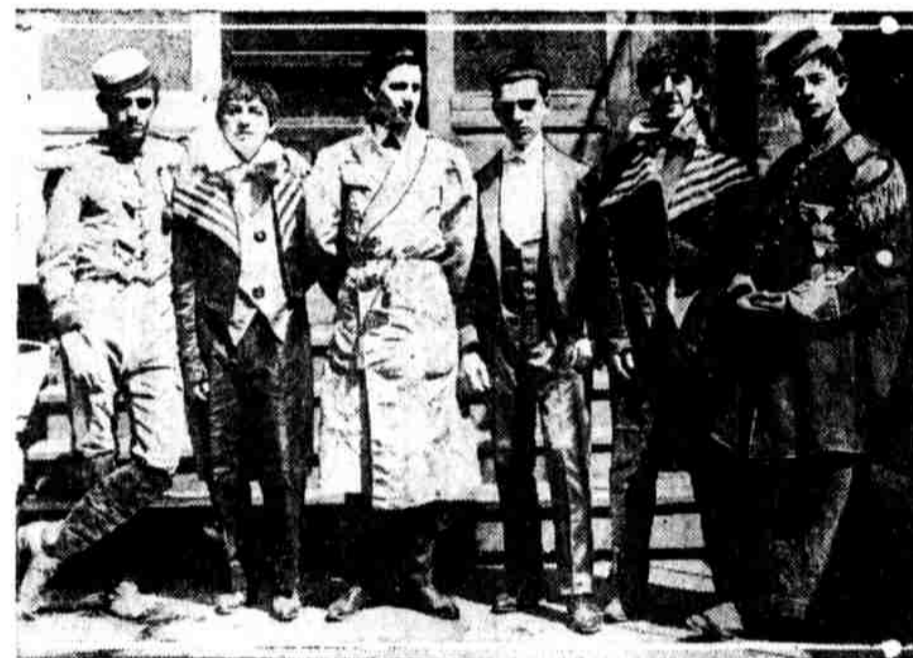

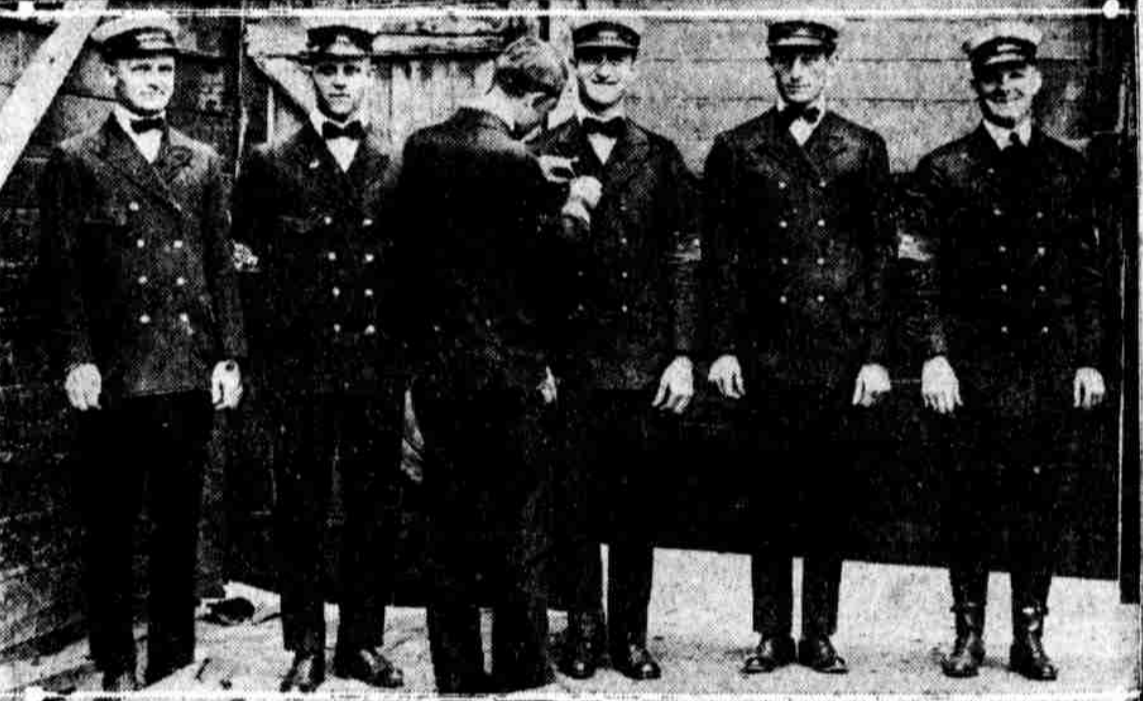
WHEN YOU KNOW HOW, as does this boy scout, real fires can be started with the aid of the long iron rod and the flint stone. He is Robert Thankouser.
