BACK SPROUL, MOORE ANNOUNCES TO PRESBYTERIANS

Mayor Informs Commissioners He Is Not a Candidate—Goes Only as Delegate
DR. M'COLL PAYS A HIGH TRIBUTE TO CITY EXECUTIVE
Governor Welcomes Churchmen to 132d Session of General Assembly at Academy

President's Pastor Here

The Rev. Dr. Wallace Radcliff, pastor of the New York Avenue Church, Washington, which President Wilson attends, is present at the Presbyterian General Assembly here. He is a former moderator.

Mayor Moore, addressing the 132d General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the U. S. A. at the Academy of Music, announced this morning that he would support Governor Sproul for the Republican presidential nomination.

Both the Mayor and the Governor address the 1000 commissioners of the Presbyterian Church, who filled the lower floor of the Academy at the beginning of the second day of the assembly.

Pays Tribute to Mayor
In introducing Mr. Moore, Doctor MacColl paid him a high tribute, and spoke of him as a man fit to guide the destinies of the nation.

"I am to be only a delegate to the national convention," said the Mayor, "but I am going to do it as a delegate, not a candidate."

Pleas for Civic Decency
The Mayor made a strong plea for civic decency. "We have gone through a remarkable experience here in Philadelphia," he said.

"It is the duty of the city administration to keep us clean," he said, "and the duty of the citizen to help."

Better Streets Needed
"Sewer construction is another big problem. The Mayor is also particularly interested in the paving of streets."

Stresses Duty to State
