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Roma, 20 maggio.—I capi dei partiti radicali, liberali, democratici, democratico costituzionale e riformista, hanno tenuto questa sera separate riunioni ed hanno deciso di sostenere il nuovo Gabinetto formato dall'On. Nitti.

Francesco Saverio Nitti, presidente del Consiglio ed Interni; Vittorio Scialoja, Ministro per gli Affari Esteri; On. Bonomi, Ministro per la Guerra; Ammiraglio Scelbi, Ministro della Marina; On. De Nava, Ministro per i Lavori Pubblici; On. Torre, Ministro dell'Istruzione; On. Schanzer, Ministro del Tesoro; On. Alessio, Ministro delle Finanze.

Gli altri portafogli sarebbero assegnati agli onorevoli Bertini, Mesi e Ferni.

A titolo di cronaca e preside' chiaramente dimostra a quali notizie fantastiche si ricorra per designare l'Italia, riportiamo il seguente telegramma giunto, ieri, da Londra:

Londra, 20 maggio.—Secondo un dispaccio giunto da Milano al London Times, mercoledì sera in Roma corsero voci riguardo ad un completo per un colpo di stato in Italia. Si dice che il Generale Peppino Garibaldi prese parte ad una riunione organizzata dal cosiddetto "gruppo del rinnovamento," il quale decide di occupare gli edifici pubblici durante la giornata di giovedì.

La notizia e' vaga, ma il Times dice che il suo corrispondente annuncia che qualche cosa di vero vi e' nei rumori che corrono, tanto che la polizia e la Guardia Regia fin da mercoledì ha occupato gli edifici pubblici per proteggerli contro qualsiasi attacco. Che avvenne non appena si ebbe sentore dei negoziati corsi tra il Generale Garibaldi e Giuseppe Cairoli capo del gruppo proletto.

HUNGARY TO SIGN; DELEGATES QUIT

Decision to Accept Allied Terms
Made With Many Bitter
Protests

HAVE HOPES FOR FUTURE

Budapest, May 21.—Here Franzavszky, representing the Hungarian government, has presented to Premier Millerand in Paris two documents, the first containing the resignation of the Hungarian peace delegation and the second announcing its compliance with the terms of the peace treaty and a statement that it will appoint a new peace delegation for signing the treaty when the exact date is fixed for this purpose.

The text of the two documents will be printed here today. Up to the present there were no indications in Budapest of a decision to sign the treaty, and it is thought there may be difficulty in finding men who will take the odium of affixing their signatures to the compact.

There is no indication of any resentment against Count Albert Apponyi, former head of the Hungarian peace delegation. Although his endeavors to secure better terms from the Allies that were stated in the peace treaty were fruitless, the realization seems to prevail that he did his best to save a disreputable name. Apponyi was particularly affected by the fate of 2,500,000 Magyars cut off from the motherland and refused a plebiscite to decide their wishes. This fact constituted the burden of his complaint in his letter of resignation.

The letter announcing the resignation of the delegation, as written by Count Apponyi, follows:

"The definite text of the treaty does not contain a single essential modification to that which was presented to us in January. It was not the historical right of Hungary to her ancient territories that we invoked. It was the right of the populations concerned that we

insisted on when we requested a plebiscite and we still request this.

"We are painfully surprised to learn that the Allies refuse in our case application of principles which they themselves have proclaimed, namely, the indisputable right of peoples to self-determination.

"Whatever the loyalty with which we may fulfill every obligation resulting from the treaty, the moral tie uniting us to these peoples will never be broken. Also we shall never cease to lay before the League of Nations their complaints of suffering.

"We acknowledge that some of our economic and financial observations have been considered. Yet the natural outlets of the country are not assured in the direction of the Adriatic, Aegean or Black seas. The country is left

charged with financial obligations it cannot fulfill.

"The decisive facts are the dismemberment of Hungary and the refusal of a plebiscite. Therefore, the treaty is not acceptable and the delegation does not regard itself authorized to sign it. However, we do not hesitate to establish the fact that the Allies' covering letter opens a way to reparations for certain justities."

The government's letter of compliance to the treaty terms, signed by Alexander Simonyi-Sendreny, premier, and Count Paul Teleky, foreign minister, declares that Hungary is brought nearer admission to the League of Nations. It says that Hungary will sign the treaty in supposition that the promises of the Allies will be fulfilled.

LEAGUE ISSUE IN OREGON

Covenant Enters Into G. O. P and Democratic Contests Today
Portland, Ore., May 21.—(By A. P.)—The League of Nations was an outstanding issue both in the Republican contest for presidential endorsement and the contest for Democratic nomination for United States senator in the Oregon primary today.

The active candidates for the Republican presidential preference are General Wood, Governor Lawden and Senator Johnson. The names of Senator Poindexter and Herbert Hoover also appear on the Republican ballot, but Sen-

ator Poindexter announced his withdrawal from the Oregon contest and Mr. Hoover's campaign managers in the state have asked Republicans to throw their strength to the pro-league candidate they believe to have the best chance of defeating the "no-league candidate" of Hiram Johnson.

The name of William G. McAdoo is the only one appearing on the ballot as a Democratic candidate for President.

Senator Chamberlain, seeking reelection, is opposed for the Democratic nomination by Harvey G. Starkweather, an avowed supporter of President Wilson.

SEE TURK RULE ENDED

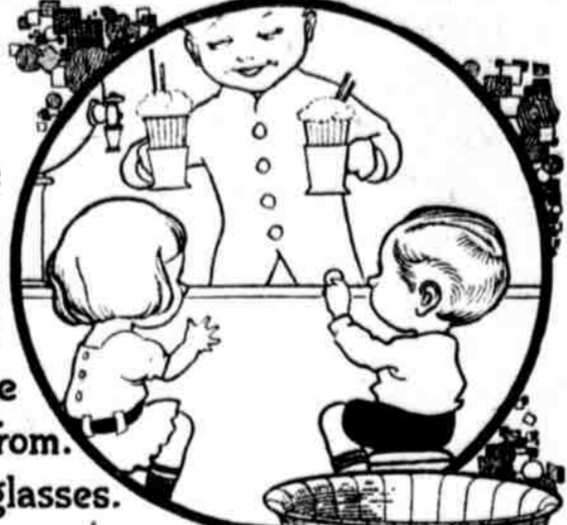
Diplomats Believe Ottomans Will Accept Allied Terms
Washington, May 21.—Turkey is expected to head the neck with true Oriental fatalism to the terms of the Turkish treaty now being examined by the Turkish delegates in Paris. This is the opinion of well informed diplomatic officials here in close touch with the Near East situation.

In the opinion of these officials the greatest trouble which the Allies have had to encounter with the Turks, in-

cluding the militaristic thorn implanted by Mustafa Kemal Pasha, has passed. Conservative figures place the total of officers under the command of the Nationalist leader at 40,000, of whom only 15,000 safely may be counted upon for anything approaching a first-class military operation. In an emergency Greek troops at Smyrna, it is believed, easily could take care of these forces, operating in conjunction with British forces from Constantinople southward in Anatolia.

The original force of the national movement, however, according to all accounts, has subsided.
