

TRUCK KILLS MAN; HURLED FROM AUTO

Oscar Ailes, Prominent Woodbury Man, Thrown Under Wheel as Car Is Sidewiped

PHILADELPHIA DRIVER HELD

Oscar Ailes, forty-one years old, a prominent citizen of Woodbury, N. J., was instantly killed at 10:15 o'clock last night when his automobile was sidwiped by a heavy motor truck on the main street of Woodbury.

Mr. Ailes was hurled from his automobile under the heavy truck. The rear left wheel passed over his head, crushing him to death.

Several persons witnessed the accident.

Mr. Ailes, with Lewis Muller, also of Woodbury, was returning from a pleasure trip in his roadster. The car was proceeding down Broad street in Woodbury at moderate speed.

At Dubois avenue the motor truck, lumbering toward Philadelphia in the opposite direction, came too close to the Ailes machine.

Front Wheels Locked

There was a crash as the front wheels locked, and Mr. Ailes and Mr. Muller were both hurled from their seats.

Force of the collision threw Mr. Ailes headlong under the motor truck. Roy Letellier, of Thirty-ninth and Wallace streets, Philadelphia, driver of the truck, threw on the emergency brake.

The momentum of the heavy truck carried it a distance of several feet before it could be stopped. The broad rear left wheel passed directly over Mr. Ailes's head.

Companion Not Hurt

Mr. Muller, who was thrown clear of the motor truck, was not injured.

When witnesses of the accident reached Mr. Ailes he was dead.

Mr. Ailes leaves a widow and one son. He was head of the Constitution Co., a printing establishment in Woodbury, and was one of the town's most prominent citizens.

Roy Letellier, the truck driver, was arrested by the Woodbury police, and is being held to await the outcome of the inquest, to be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon by Coroner David Hesser.

HUNGRY, YET FEEDS KITTENS

Woman, Alone and Penniless, Obtained Milk for Only Companions

Mrs. Mary Connor had no food for herself for a week, but she somehow managed to keep life in four little black kittens, three weeks old and without a mother, who were her only companions in an empty house at 630 Rush street.

Today, when she was taken to City Hall on her way to the Philadelphia Hospital, her only trouble was that two of the kittens had been lost. The other two she carried with her, wrapped up in her lap on the trip downtown in the patrol wagon of the Germantown and Lycoming avenues police station.

The woman, who is old and helpless, had lived with a brother and sister at the Rush street house. A week ago they moved. She refused to go with them, staying behind in the empty house with only an old quilt and some odds and ends of clothing for a covering. She had no money and no means of earning a living. For the entire week she went without food herself, yet getting an occasional saucer of milk to keep the kittens alive.

Last night neighbors told the police about the old woman, fearing she would die. Two of the kittens disappeared in the excitement of moving her to the station house. She held the other two in her arms all night in the matron's room.

SAYS FARMERS MUST WORK

McClain Asserts It is Up to Them to Reduce Cost of Food

Farmers who "farm with their mouths" and not with their hands and brains will have much to do with the question of the reduction of prices of foodstuffs, according to State Fair Price Commissioner Frank B. McClain.

Mr. McClain declared today that the ultimate reduction in foodstuffs, along the lines recently seen in clothing and other merchandise, depends on three things: good crop weather, whether or not this country continues to try to feed parts of Europe and the industry and work of the farmers.

"Farmers who take a day off at harvest time to go to a meeting in a neighbor's house to discuss why black hens lay white eggs," said Mr. McClain, "are those who will be responsible for keeping food prices up. The right kind of farmer is the one who spends that time seeing that his black hens lay those eggs."

DR. MUTTART RE-ELECTED

He Will Head Osteopathic Society for Another Year

SHOT IN ROW OVER CRAPS

Mexican Seaman, Police Say, Refused to Play—Two Arrested

Frank Betrancourt, twenty-one years old, a Mexican seaman, was shot in the jaw last night, police say, because he refused to shoot "craps" with loaded dice.

The shooting occurred at the home of Florio Rosen, twenty-eight years old, of Lombard street near Third, according to the police. They say Rosen entered the Mexican into his home and suggested a game of "craps."

Betrancourt believed the dice were loaded and refused to play. Then, police say, Rosen struck the Mexican and took \$60 from his pocket. When Betrancourt showed fight, Rosen is alleged to have whipped out a German 32-caliber revolver and shot the Mexican in the jaw.

Betrancourt, who is of the crew of the tanker John Morris, is in the Pennsylvania Hospital. Detectives of the Third and De Lancey streets station arrested Rosen at Eighth and Spruce streets with Stella Hobbes, who is being held as a witness.

Truck Driver Held in Girl's Death

Angelo Rononano, thirty-one years old, 1722 South Ninth street, was held without bail by Magistrate Dougherty today at the Twenty-eighth and Fifty-second streets station, to await the coroner's action in the death of five-year-old Edna Couwell, 1845 McKean street. The little girl was playing yesterday afternoon near her home when she was struck by a touring car driven by Rononano on McKean street near Nineteenth. She was taken to St. Agnes's Hospital, where she died of internal injuries late last night.
