

AIR SCHOOL ISSUES IN MEETING TONIGHT

All Sides of Teachers' Salary to Be Presented at Academy Session

MANY NOTABLES TO SPEAK

All sides of the teachers' salary situation will be presented at the mass-meeting to be held in the Academy of Music tonight, in an effort to inform the public of conditions that must be faced without delay.

Governor Sproul, prominent disinterested citizens, members of the board of education, and leading teachers will speak from their viewpoint and a better understanding of the problem will be given the taxpayers of this community.

The speakers also include Mayor Moore, William A. Dick, secretary of the board of education; Edward Bok, chairman of the meeting; and Miss Margaret Maguire, supervising principal of the McCall School. Music will be given by the Campbell school orchestra and by the Holmes Junior High School chorus. Appropriate recitations will be given by Rose Keys, Rose Kavanagh and Louis Miller, pupils in the schools.

Resolutions to be adopted will be presented and discussed by Ellis A. Gimbel, George W. Swenson, Carr and George Wharton Pepper.

Expect Gratz and Beeber
Simon Gratz, president of the board; Judge Beeber and other members of the board are expected to attend the meeting as guests of the citizens' committee.

There is no breach to be spanned on the question of the inadequacy of the salaries. All parties to the discussion agree that the teachers are underpaid and that the present salaries in Philadelphia do not compare favorably with those of other cities where recently adopted schedules are already in effect.

In Philadelphia there are two advance salary plans approved by the board, an equalization schedule adopted March 9, made partially effective as of January 1. The remaining increases on this schedule will be forthcoming January 1, 1921, and January 1, 1922. The second schedule is the one presented by Thomas E. Pincen, state superintendent of schools, approved by the board last month, but not possible of adoption until approved by the Legislature, which meets next year.

Mr. Dick will tell what means are available for granting a bonus to teachers at once, or for making an increase in salaries effective immediately.

Number of Plans Presented
A number of plans have been presented, both by the board and by the teachers, which have not been regarded as satisfactory. Some have been cleared legally possible, but have been regarded as economically unwise.

In the meantime, teachers in the local schools have been working after hours and on Saturdays to make more money in order to maintain a standard of living adopted when the value of the dollar was twice its present value. Thomas S. Boyle and Joseph W. Catherine, both members of the Board of Education, have told the members of the citizens' committee that they are with the teachers. "The public must pay teachers enough to buy at least an occasional book or magazine, to go at least occasionally to hear fine concerts, to be able to give to worthy charities, in brief, to live fully in order to give abundantly to our children," says Mr. Boyle.

"Save the schools' should be the paramount issue during the fall campaign and should be alive until satisfactorily disposed of by the Legislature," according to Mr. Catherine. "The Board of Education is with you in the movement and will aid the teachers to the utmost of its financial resources."
