

TURKISH GUNS FAIL TO DETER GREEKS

Karagatch, Suburb of Constantinople, Is Shelled as Hellenic Troops Occupy It

FRENCH FORCES LEAVING

By the Associated Press Constantinople, May 31.—Karagatch, a suburb of Adrianople, situated on the right bank of the Maritza river, which is being occupied by Greek troops, was under fire from Turkish artillery yesterday. Shrapnel shells fell about the station, but the building was not damaged. Several small encounters between Greek and Turkish forces south of Karagatch are reported.

Ten thousand Bulgarians, members of irregular bands of troops, have assembled at Harmanli, about sixty miles northwest of Adrianople on the Maritza.

Jafar Tayer, Turkish commander at Adrianople, has announced his troops will not fight in any Thracian towns until after French forces have left. The French soldiers still remaining in Karagatch are being taken in their trains and ready to leave.

Greek troops began the occupation of Turkish Thrace on Friday and the first trainload has arrived at a point opposite Adrianople.

The French landed 2000 troops at Batumi May 29 to co-operate with the British. The seven-day armistice between the republics of Georgia and Azerbaijan was broken four days after it had gone into effect, according to messages from Tiflis. The entire situation in the Caucasus has become so orientally complex that even the sharpest of western minds here seem unable to comprehend it.

Foreign observers in Georgia and Armenia, however, offer no hope that good for Armenia is coming of it.

Paris, May 31.—The Turkish delegation has sent a note to the Peace Conference asking a further delay, until July 11, to present the delegation's answer to the Allies regarding the peace treaty.

50,000 MARCH IN NEW YORK

Veterans of Three Wars Parade to Honor Slain Comrades

New York, May 31.—By A. P.—Fifty thousand veterans of three wars marched in Memorial Day parades held in the five boroughs of the city today. Featured in the lines of march were bearded veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic who, despite their years, marched at the head of the column.

The main parade was in Manhattan, in which marched, in addition to the men of '65, Spanish American war veterans and smooth-faced youths with gold chevrons won at St. Mihiel and in Argonne.

Solemn memorial exercises were to be held later in the day at Grant's tomb overlooking the Hudson, with Representative Richard Yates, a former governor of Illinois, as the chief speaker.

"JUNE WEEK" AT ANNAPOLIS

Baccalaureate Sermon Preached to Naval Academy Graduates

Annapolis, May 31.—"June Week" at the Naval Academy was officially opened yesterday when Chaplain B. H. Patrick, of the academy, preached the baccalaureate sermon to the 300 graduates.

The chief event today will be the unveiling of a window in the chapel to the memory of Admiral David G. Farragut. Rear Admiral Colby M. Chester will make the address, and it will be uncovered by Miss Camilla Sewall, of Bath, Me., a grandniece of Admiral Farragut.

POLES ATTACK BOLSHIEVIKI

Counter-Blows Drive Foes From Several Dvina Districts

Warsaw, May 31.—An official communication issued here yesterday says: "The Poles are counter-attacking at various points on the northern front. Several districts in the nearby country of the Dvina have been cleared of the Bolshieviki. The fighting is particularly severe in the regions of Borisov and Bobrusk, where the Reds have been driven back at several places.

"The Reds still are holding much ground taken during the last two weeks and are bringing up additional reinforcements. It is known that there are twenty Red divisions on the northern front. This is considered by militarists as the greatest concentration ever lined up against the Poles.

"The Poles have reassured the public that there is no fear of the enemy breaking through."

Plans have been begun to call up the class of 1902. Militarists explain that this is the natural course of the military program in connection with the Bolshievik menace in the north.

WARSHIPS MAY GO TO ERIN

Very Serious Situation Is Reported by London Newspaper

London, May 31.—The National News says: "The position in Ireland, we understand, is so grave that a number of warships are now being fitted out at Sheerness for dispatch to Irish ports. The situation is more serious than would appear from published telegrams, and startling developments are expected in the next few days. In the present temper of the Sinn Feiners it is not unlikely they will make a last effort against the forces of law and order."

Skibbereen, Ireland, May 31.—A mail train from Bantry to Cork was held up at Durrus Road station by armed men yesterday. The men took the mail bags and dumped in an automobile. The Berhaven customs office was destroyed by fire yesterday.

NOYES SOON TO COME HOME

American Member of Rhineland Commission Returning

Coblenz, May 31.—By A. P.—Pierpont B. Noyes, American member of the inter-allied Rhineland commission, whose resignation was announced yesterday, expects to terminate his relations with the commission and turn over his responsibilities to Major General Henry T. Allen within ten days.

The staff of the commission will remain under General Allen's direction.

PER IL RINVIO DEL CONVEGNO DI SPA

Nitti Vuole che il Parlamento Discuta Prima Importanti Progetti di Legge

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Roma, 30 maggio.—Se l'opposizione da parte della Francia impedirà il postponimento della conferenza di Spa, alla quale il Presidente del Consiglio dei Ministri On. Nitti bisogna sia presente, il Parlamento italiano avrà soltanto il tempo di discutere il programma del governo relativamente all'esercizio provvisorio, prima di aggiornarsi verso la metà di giugno.

La speranza per il postponimento della conferenza di Spa è tuttora intensa dal gabinetto il quale desidera che il Parlamento discuta pare-chie leggi, compresa quella che autorizza la revisione dei dettagli circa i contratti di guerra e reclamare gli ammonti eccedenti. Un'altra importante legge è quella che dovrebbe regolare le estese proprietà, specialmente nell'Italia meridionale, e stabilire le norme per la divisione in piccoli lotti.

Le autorità governative sono principalmente interessate nel ristabilire le finanze della Nazione, cercando di incassare tutte le tasse e ridurre così, gradatamente, il deficit. Nello stesso tempo il Ministero si prepara a prendere energiche misure contro gli speculatori sul cambio. Le responsabilità di alcuni di questi speculatori per operazioni che turbano il benessere del paese dovranno essere accertate allo scopo di tradurli innanzi ai competenti tribunali.

Allo scopo di ristabilire una atmosfera salubre nei circoli finanziari, il Governo ha ordinato una rigida inchiesta circa un recente accentramento di azioni di compagnie a banche a detrimento degli azionisti. Tale inchiesta dovrà essere specialmente diretta per le azioni della Banca Commerciale.

RUMORS OF REVOLT HEARD IN BERLIN

New Movement Believed Directed by Former Emperor's Son, August William

MUELLER URGES PEACE

By the Associated Press London, May 31.—Rumors of an impending revolt are steadily growing in

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Berlin, and there are indications the headquarters of the new revolutionary movement are at Potsdam, where Prince August William, son of former Emperor William, is staying. He is regarded as the leader of the military party, says a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. Advice from Doorn, where the former emperor is now living, declare William Hohenzollern is in high hopes of a successful coup and believes he will once more become ruler of the German empire, the dispatch says.

Commanders of the garrison of Greater Berlin visited the minister of defense today and took the oath that they and their corps were ready to protect the constitution by force against any attempted coup which the Right or Left may attempt.

Minister of Defense Gessler, in an interview published in the Frankfurter Zeitung, stated today that the volunteer

corps which might have supported a revolt, should not be organized by the Right party, would cease to exist from today and that any attempt to keep them organized would be punishable by imprisonment up to five years with hard labor.

Minister Gessler also declared that the Doberitz brigade, which was formed especially to protect the republic, was ready to fulfill that duty and any fresh effort to overthrow the constitution would be suppressed with the utmost energy.

Speaking in Munich Saturday, Chancellor Mueller declared to a cheering crowd that on June 6, the day of the German presidential election, it would be Germany's business to attest the fact "that she has had enough of war for all eternity, and that no fool, crowned or uncrowned, shall drag Germany into a war of revenge," according to a report of his address in the Tageblatt today.

"Foreigners," continued Mueller, "have told me they could not believe it possible that the frame of mind of the German people could be changed in so short a time, but after the Kapp coup even the Entente military officers admitted to me their conviction that we had become truly democratic."

The chancellor referred to the conference at Spa as the first ray of hope which Germany could entertain that the Extremists realize the impossibility of keeping Germany down economically and politically and at the same time demanding extreme armaments in reparation.
