

### CITY LEGION POSTS GET 150 DELEGATES

150 Post Commanders and Adjutants Also May Sit in State Cantonment

Philadelphia will be entitled to send to the state cantonment of the American Legion in Allentown, June 18 and 19, 300 legionaries—150 delegates and 150 post commanders and adjutants. Only the delegates may vote.

The Philadelphia delegation will represent seventy-eight posts. Each post has one delegate and one more for each 100 paid-up members. The actual Legion strength in this city is greatly in excess of the paid-up membership.

An acute situation has arisen regarding hotel accommodations for the cantonment at Allentown. A tabulation of available rooms shows only 1345. It was reported that a committee in Allentown would take care of all reservations, but now state headquarters has advised delegates to make their own reservations

and notify Edward J. Quinn, chairman of the committee, at 457 Tilghman street, Allentown.

Captain Walter M. Gearty Post No. 318 has a forty-two-piece band, which appeared in a firemen's parade in Chester, Pa., and in the Red Men's parade

in this city. This post has a membership of 472, and has elected as its delegates to the state cantonment David B. Simpson, commander; C. W. Fry, William R. Bradley, Lawrence H. Barrett, D. Norman Cona, James P. Cousart, Horace J. Inman.

The band of Prince-Forbes Post 7 held a successful dance at Volter's Academy, Fifty-second and Market streets. The proceeds will be used in addition to the \$350 spent by the post to purchase instruments.

The post will meet the second and

fourth Thursdays of each month during the summer. The post baseball team has played two games this season and is open to book games with all

first-class teams in the city, semipro or otherwise. The post has passed the 400 membership mark and the indications are it will reach 500 by July.
