### SPRUCE CABIN INN DESTROYED BY FIRE

S. Crider Kemp, Phila. Realty Man, Left Shoeless After Blaze in Poconos

### LOSS IS ABOUT \$75,000

S. Crider Kemp, a real estate dealer, of 1822 South Broad street, is the only Philadelphian known to have been a guest at the Spruce Cabin Inn in the Poconos, which was destroyed by fire last night.

Starting out early yesterday morning with a party of friends from New York, he spent the day along a trout stream and returned to the hotel at 10 o'clock last night to discover it in ashes.

"I'm all right," he said this morning, over the long distance telephone, "except that I have no shoes save a pair of hip-boots."

The fire completely destroyed the Spruce Cabin Inn, with a loss estimated at \$75,000. More than 100 guests were driven from the hotel, just as they were dressing for dinner.

Spent Day Fishing

Mr. Kemp went to the Poconos last Thursday with Walter Richter and the Misses Richter, of New York.

"We were up bright and early yesterday morning, with our rods and reels," he said. "We fished hard all day, whipping the pools for several miles downstream.

"The trout were feeding, and we had several fine kills. About 4 o'clock, we decided we had gone far enough. We built a campfire, and improvising a stone stove, cooked our trout.

"After dinner, we sat around the campfire until it began to die down.

"Then we started for home. As darkness came on we noticed that the sky in the direction of the hotel was as red as an inferno. As we neared the hotel the illumination grew brighter.
