

LEGION TO PROVIDE MILITARY BURIALS

Special Committee Named to Aid Families When Soldiers' Bodies Return

EXPECT FIRST IN AUTUMN

Philadelphia American Legion posts will try to assist families of soldier dead in providing military funerals. A special committee was appointed today by the county chairman to plan for this upon the return of soldier dead from France under direction of the War Department. This committee, headed by Joseph Roper, of Post No. 207, includes Frank W. Melvin, Post No. 70, and Michael Fitzpatrick, Falls of Schuylkill Post. The committee will communicate with the War Department in order to obtain any information which it may have as to the plan of delivering the bodies to the various centers of population. It is expected the bodies will begin

to arrive early in September and the Legion desires to have the machinery so organized by that time that the great number of requests which will be made for military funerals may be complied with. The women's auxiliary of the James J. Harry Post met Tuesday evening. A card party and dance for the memorial fund will be given at the home of Mrs. Borbridge, 5010 Cedar avenue, June 10. Delegates from this city to the Allentown state convention may make the trip on a special train. An offer to provide such special facilities has been made and will receive consideration. Comrade Edward A. Taunt, of Post No. 153, has announced that this post has organized a uniformed baseball team which has played a game every Saturday since the season opened and has not lost one.
