

SALVATION ARMY CEREMONY

Cornerstone is Laid for \$50,000 Building in North Philadelphia The cornerstone for a Salvation Army building for North Philadelphia, which will cost approximately \$50,000, was laid with appropriate ceremony last night by Colonel Richard E. Hols, commander of the Atlantic Coast Province, at Germantown avenue near Huntingdon street. Major William C. Crawford and Major Charles Campbell assisted in the service, which was attended by several hundred Salvationists. A Salvation Army band furnished the music. A combination roof garden, playground and skating rink will be a distinctive feature of the new building. The roof garden will be used as a playground for children during the summer, and will be flooded and used as a skating rink in winter. An auditorium, accommodating upwards of 200 persons, will be used for religious services and entertainments. In addition, there will be a large gymnasium, band room and several class rooms. The new building will be the headquarters of No. 4 Corps, which is at present located at 1938 Germantown avenue. Ensign Charles Mehling is the officer in charge.

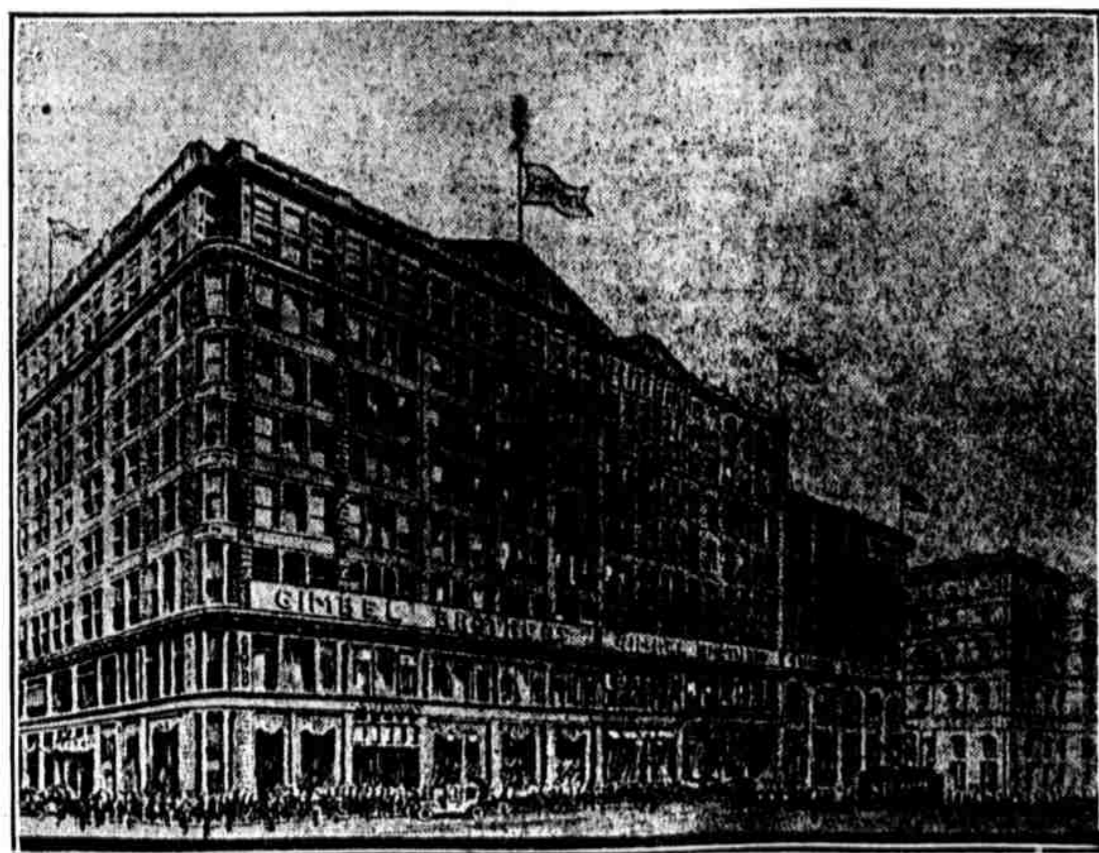

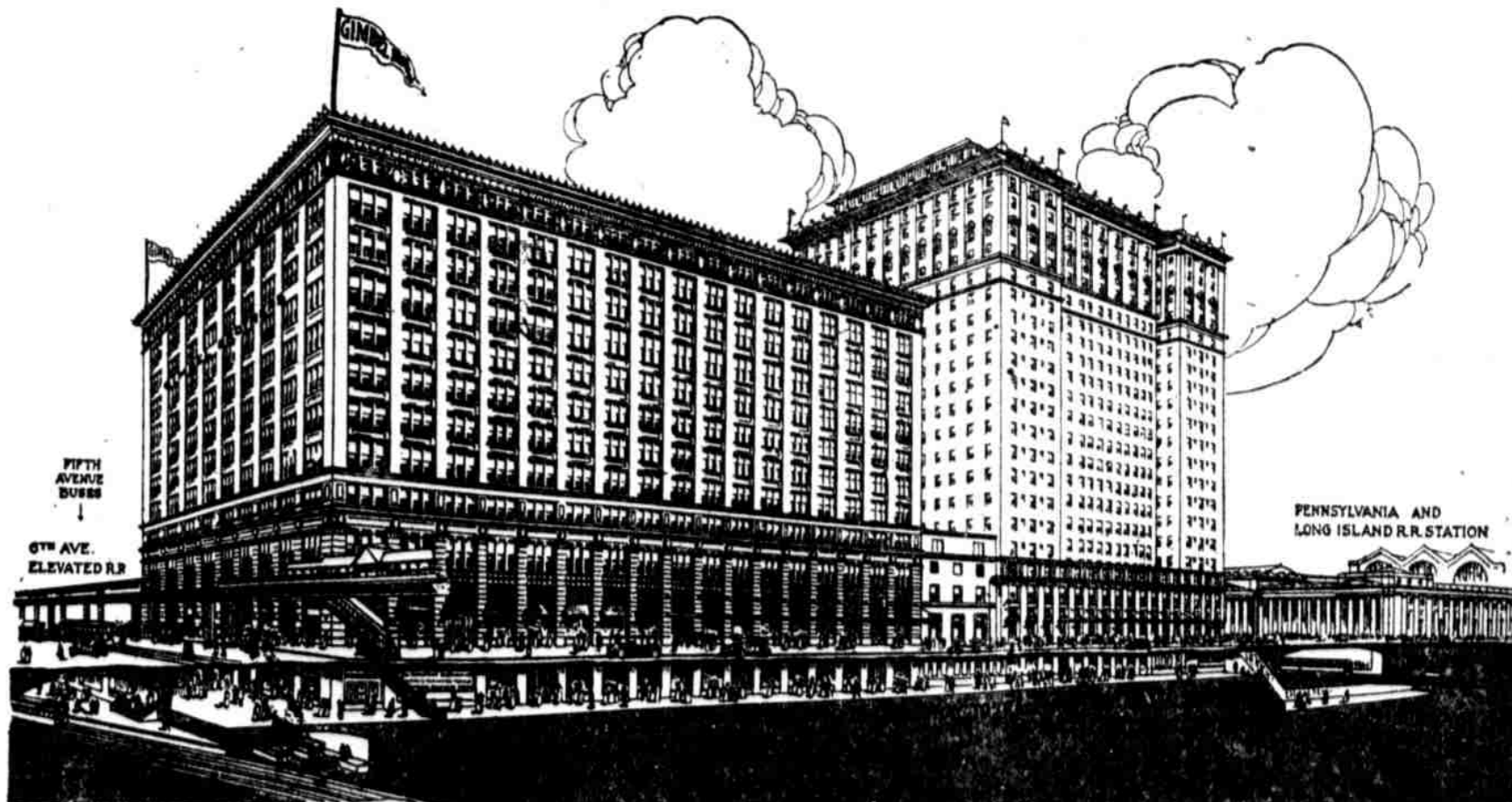
