THE boys are hitting 'em high and far this year. Two and three baggers are quite common and home runs urnish only a passing thrill. Everybody is slugging the apple, batting records are being smashed and if a player lan't hitting around .300 he is having a bum year.

With Babe Ruth on the rampage, trying to knock own fences and grand stands and things like that, most crest naturally is in the home-run figgers. Every day ody clouts one and the fans are wondering what it's all about. On Thursday, for example, six home runs were made in the major leagues-three in the American and three in the National. The other day Ruth had three a one afternoon. Therefore it is not at all strange that owers of baseball are beginning to believe the ball is lier than in years and more rubber is used by the nanufacturer.

We have heard hundreds of persons discussing this ustion, and here is the answer. The regulation baseball has not been changed for years and there is little sance for a change. This was divulged by Thomas D. secretary and factory manager of the A. J. Reach Co., where most of the balls are made.

"There is no change in the baseballs this year." said "The same kind of yarn, rubber and cork are Shibe. og used, and if there is any improvement it is in the cover. Leather has been very scarce the last few years and we were forced to use an inferior grade. Now, however, we are back at the old standard

The ball is not any livelier than last year or the year before. It virtually is the same. There is nothing in that story of the balls being made of more rubber so the hitting is increased. We get the same amount of k, rubber and yarn, put them together in the same way and therefore the product is the same. I read with interest recently that there was a difference in the wool and the Australian brand was being used. We have been using that same stuff for years. The ball has not been changed in any particular."

"How do you account for the exceptionally good hit-ting this year?" he was asked. . . .

"WELL, if you look over the old records you will find that everybody hits well early in the season. The pitchers are not yet in the best of shape, but will be by the end of this month. Then see how the hitting falls off.

#### **Figgers Not Abnormal**

NOTHER reason, according to experts, is the legisla-A tion against all forms of freak deliveries except the spitball. The emory, shine, licerice and tailow ball have ed out of the picture and only a few spitters are left. This means the batters are hitting the ball more solidly and getting more distance. When a spitball artist is operating there are few solid, long hits. The batter usually knocks the pill straight up in the air or down on the ground. Perhaps there is something to this theory, and anyway, it should be accepted until proved otherwise.

Now let's drag in the figgers again and see what is appening under the Big Top. As was said before, the boys are hitting 'em high and far, but outside of Babe Buth no individual is setting the world afire with record elanis. Ruth is a natural hitter, regarded the best shall ever has seen, and would have pulled the same stuff under the same conditions ten or twenty years ago.

The others, however, are sailing along in the same a groove. In the American League, Ruth has fifteen rs to his credit, and next to him are Tilly Walker and Happy Felsch, with six each. They are hitting at normal gait. Tris Speaker has four ; Jacobson, Hooper, Heilman, Dugan, Peckinpaugh, Dykes, Jimmy Williams, St. Louis, and Flagstead have three each, and that

is not surprising. Joe Jackson, who usually is up in front, has connected with but one circuit clout, and the same goes for Sisler, Schang, Roth and a flock of others. Therefore you can't blame a lively ball on the figgers, and that's that.

Cy Williams leads the National with six, Davy Robertson has four, Hornsby, Paskert, Hi Meyers and Casey Stengel three each, and Irish Meusel and Lebourveau two. This is perfectly same and rational bitting, but nothing is said because there is no Babe Ruth on the circuit. The batting is the same as in other years and is likely to suffer a terrible slump in the next three months. It will be well to remember that the season is less than two months old and the warm werther has not thawed the arms of the flingers.

HE American League leads in home runs, forty-L cight different athletes registering a total of 101 thus far. That's pretty good clouting and overshadows the work of the Nationals. In that league thirty-three gents have poled out fifty-one four-basers, or about one-half as many as the others. Perhaps the pitching is better in the National or the American Leaguers are better hitters, but whatever it is, the score is 101 to 51.
