BY SPICK HALL. IF TODAY'S weather continues to be as calm and sparkling as it was yesterday, this will be a large day and the beginning of a big week for tennis in the vicinity of Philadelphia.

This afternoon the much-postponed finals in doubles of the women's championships of Pennsylvania and Eastern States will be staged on the turf courts of the Merion Cricket Club, Haverford.

The men play the first round of the Philadelphia and district championships on the turf at the Germantown Cricket Club, Manlietta, and most of the women's Philadelphia and district championships on the turf at the Merion Cricket Club, Haverford.

Miss Thayer will not compete at Wilmington, but Miss Townsend, who is the present title holder, will be there to defend.

Among the other entries from York who will play at Wilmington are Mrs. Harvey, Mrs. Huff and Miss Phyllis Walsh, of the Country Club, Miss Leslie Bancroft, the local favorite.

Miss Thayer will be a prominent figure in the Delaware tournament.

Davis Cupmen Land. With the team representing the United States in Antwerp, thoughts of tennis followers turn naturally to the important matches that will be played in England during the next two months.

The team will go to London immediately where practice for the Davis cup contests will begin.

They have already been entered in the tournaments beginning at Queens on June 14, and at Wimbledon on June 22, so it will have plenty of competition before the preliminary tie for the Davis Cup against France on July 5. This will be played at Eastbourne, according to word just received from the British and French associations.

The important effect on international tennis of the first trip since the war by the country's leading players, Julian S. Myrick, as president of the United States Lawn Tennis Association, has addressed to Lord Desborough, of Taplow, president of the British association, a letter which sets forth the ideas of the national body.

Julian Myrick Writes. This states that the decision to send the team abroad was based upon the immense amount of traveling that would have been required if the United States had requested preliminary ties to be played here.

Mr. Myrick then writes: "Of far greater significance in the discussions that led to our decision, was our belief both in the important influence of international tennis upon the nation itself, and the service that the players of the United States might be able to render the game at present, by doing everything within their power to stimulate international competition."

After naming the ten which is described as "including the best players this country can produce," the letter states the association's understanding of the arrangements for the preliminary tie with France on July 5. It then says:

"It is my feeling as president of the United States Lawn Tennis Association, that the cordial relations between England and the United States should be strengthened in every way, and tennis can have an important part in accomplishing that result."
