

DIXON LEGION POST WILL HONOR TYLER

Home Unit of State Commander to Give Dinner Before State Cantonment

D'OLIER AMONG GUESTS

A complimentary dinner will be tendered to George F. Tyler, commander of the Pennsylvania Department of the American Legion, in the Bellevue-Stratford Hotel, Wednesday evening, June 10. The commander will be the guest of Dixon Post, of which he is a member.

This function will precede immediately the second annual cantonment of the legion at Allentown. It will mark the retirement of Commander Tyler from the highest Legion position in the state, which he has held since the organization.

Frank D'Olier, national commander, will be at the dinner. He will attend the cantonment. George Wentworth Carr, chairman of the county committee, will be a guest.

Discuss Special Train

At the conference of the Philadelphia delegates to the state cantonment in the City Club, 313 South Broad street, tonight, the advisability of running a special train to Allentown will be considered. There will be approximately 140 delegates from here, and 150 commanders and adjutants who will be privi-

leged to attend. Many delegates will go Thursday evening, the time designated for registration and examination of credentials.

George S. Stewart, Jr., chairman of the American Legion committee, will represent Howard C. McCall Post at Allentown, and will be accompanied by Robert J. Ganter, post adjutant and alternate.

Thomas B. Fales Post participated in flag raising at Vandergrift square, Eighth and York streets. This post will send to the state cantonment Dr. Henry Heilemann and Robert C. Stoughton, delegates, and E. R. Mitchell and Harry T. Doerr, alternates. Doctor Heilemann has been elected to represent this post in the county committee, succeeding Commander Stoughton.

Twenty More in Olney Post
Olney Post, of which Dr. Herman J. Keyser is commander, has added twenty members to its roll at its smoker recently. The baseball team of this post has opened its season on home grounds, and has won the opening game. The manager is awaiting the schedule of the athletic committee of the county committee so that this post may compete for the county honors.

Charles P. McManamy Post, of Philadelphia, will be represented at the Allentown convention by Clarence E. Campbell and L. Northrop Castor. The post is making preparations for the Fourth of July, at which time the citizens' committee of Holmesburg will present each member with a memorial medal and present to the post a sum of \$2000 towards establishing a home.

WOULD MERGE CITY AND COUNTY RULE

Charter Revision Commission Is Praised for Plan to Drop Dual Governments

Consolidation of the city and county of Philadelphia is made possible in the tentative draft of the state constitution prepared by the constitutional revision commission.

The city and county, now separate legal entities, cover precisely the same area. A movement of long standing has sought to consolidate these branches of government.

The possibility of this consolidation is regarded by the Bureau of Municipal Research as one of the constructive forward steps undertaken by the revision

commission. Other constructive steps, the bureau pointed out today, are:

"The merit principle is established in the civil service of the state and of its subdivisions.

"Optional home rule charters for cities are made possible. Proportional representation in municipalities is made optional.

"The rule-making power of the supreme court is expanded. The non-judicial functions of judges are reduced. The subject of 'justice to the poor' is given recognition.

"The way is open for shortening the county ballot.

"A state-wide agency for supervising finances of local governments is not only permitted, but is virtually required.

"The state sinking fund provisions are strengthened.

"The constitutional provisions determining debt limits of municipalities are made much simpler and clearer.

"The way is opened for the assessment of benefits against all properties whose value is enhanced by any kind of public improvement.

"The article on education is bettered in several respects.

"The direct invitation to the Legis-

lature, in the preliminary draft, to create overlapping municipalities is eliminated, and a safe workable provision for necessary joint public works and kindred undertakings between municipalities is set up.

SAILOR ROBBED ON STREET

Highwaymen Get \$200 and Diamond Ring at 12th and Cherry Streets

A sailor battled with three highwaymen at Twelfth and Cherry streets at 4 o'clock this morning, but was overpowered and robbed of \$200 and a diamond ring.

The seaman is Philip Brown, stationed at the navy yard. Three men were lurking in the shadow of a building and leaped out on him.

Brown swung right and left with his fists, but was knocked over. Two of the robbers held him while the third groped through his pockets. The glitter of his ring attracted them. They pulled it from his finger.

Brown reported the robbery to the police of the Eleventh and Winter streets station. He gave descriptions of two of the highwaymen.

FARM FOR CHILDREN

Carson-Simpson Country Place to Be Dedicated Tomorrow

The Carson-Simpson Recreation Farm, two miles above Willow Grove, will be dedicated tomorrow to the poor children of Philadelphia who never ran bare-footed through the fields, got stung by bumble-bees, or knocked green apples from a tree with a club.

Bishops Berry, Bickley, Burns and Neely, of the Methodist Church, will take part in the dedication of the farm, which is made possible through a gift of \$15,000 by Justice Alexander Simpson, Jr., and the work and care of Dr. John Waterson, of the Philadelphia city missionary division of the Methodist Church.

Besides Justice Simpson's gift, Joseph M. Perry gave \$5000 for equipment. Other gifts, totaling \$10,000 brought the total recreation farm fund to \$30,000. Children will be sent to the farm for two weeks at a time. Fifty girls will alternate with fifty boys.

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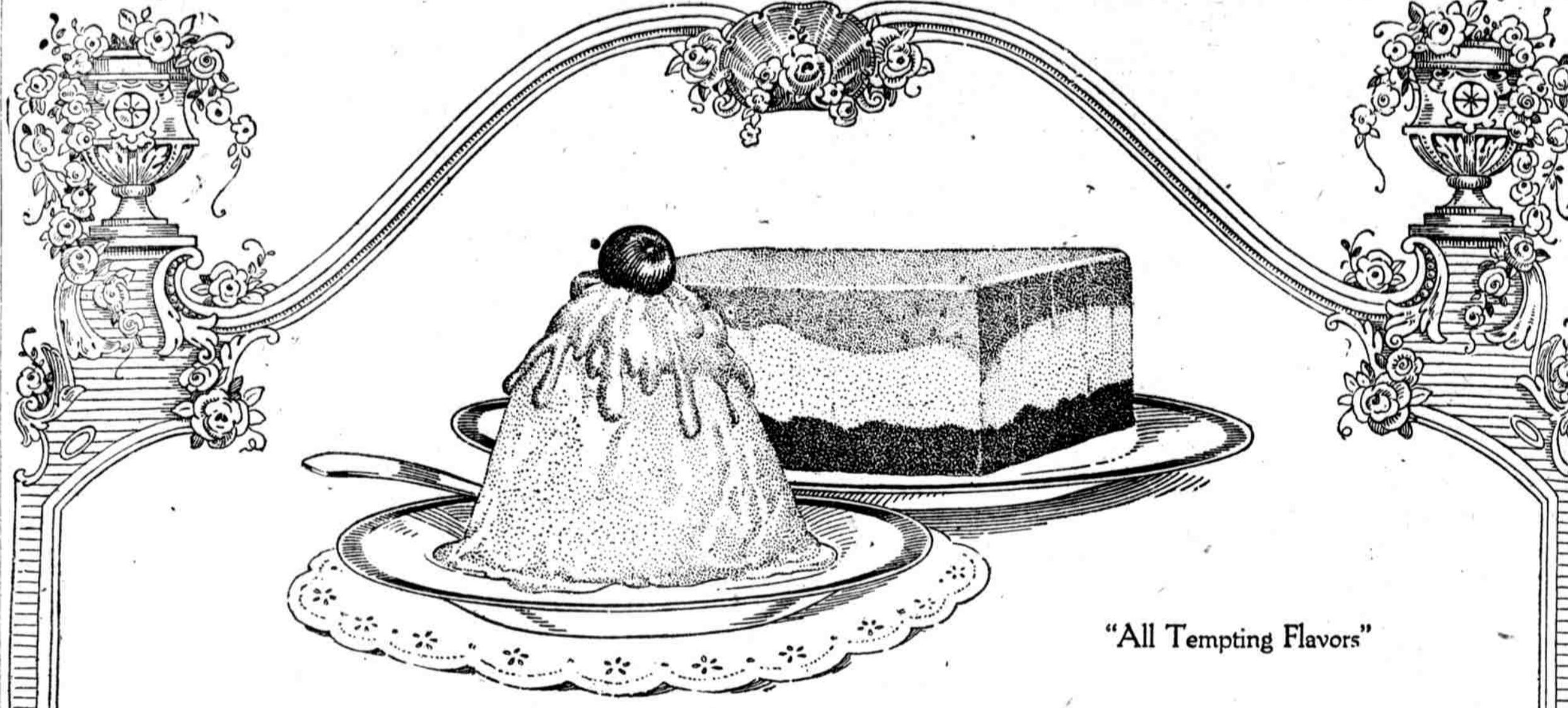
