

COOLIDGE IONIZED IN MASSACHUSETTS
Republican Party Leaders Con-
gratulate Nominee for
Vice Presidency

HARDING REPLIES TO WIRE
Boston, June 15.—Governor Coolidge,
Republican nominee for the vice presi-
dency, received congratulations from
Massachusetts leaders of the party at a
reception in the State House yesterday.

The delegates gathered from the South
station to the State House while whis-
tles of harbor craft and factories were
blown.
In reply to the congratulations Governor
Coolidge said:
"The great office to which the Nation-
al Republican Convention has nominated
me is one for which I hold the greatest
of respect. I am mindful of the great
honor that has been conferred upon me,
but beside that and apart from it, I
appreciate very much and deeply the
kindness of friends that have caused you
men and women, tired as you are from
the long convention and the long journey,
to come here this afternoon, the moment that you arrive
at your destination, and to assure me of
your friendship and of your good wishes.

After all, wishes are ended and they
fade away. Friendship and the esteem in
which you hold each other may remain
forever. And, great as I regard the
honor the convention has conferred upon
me, I regard with much more satisfaction
this tribute of you who know me, who have
lived with me and worked and wrought with me, and the
confidence that you place in me. It shows
that you love me.

Governor Coolidge last night received
the following telegram from Senator
Harding in reply to his message. Your
selection for Vice President has
strengthened our ticket by adding a
truly great and trusted American. I
am honored by the nomination.

Springfield, Mass., June 15.—Governor
Coolidge came here last night to
attend the dinner of the Amherst class
of 1885. He was met at the station by
James R. Eastman, of New York, class
president, and Frank H. Stegman, presi-
dent of the Associated Industries of
Massachusetts, and escorted to the Col-
ony Club, where the class had as-
sembled.

There he was greeted with a series
of college and class yells, to which a
"College" was appended. The govern-
or joined in singing the class and
college songs, and seemed to enjoy the
relaxation from the strain of the last
few days.

"I am not here on politics," the
governor declared. The vice-presi-
dential nominee, in an informal talk
to his classmates, confined himself to
reminders of his college days. His
roommate at college, H. P. Doring,
who is Republican candidate for the
governorship of Maine, was unable to
be present.

The governor left here this morning
to attend commencement week exercises
at Amherst. He will arrive in North-
ampton, his home city, late in the
afternoon, where a reception for him
has been planned by the townpeople.

He will go to Worcester tonight to
present diplomas to the graduating class
of Holy Cross tomorrow.

WHITLOCK MAY BE
SINGLE TAX CHIEF
Mrs. C. C. Catt Is Suggested as
Party's Nominee for Vice
Presidency

New York, June 15.—Inquiries insti-
tuted by the committee on nominations
of the Single Tax party indicate that
Brand Whitlock, formerly American
minister to Belgium, is the favorite can-
didate for President and Mrs. Carrie
Chapman Catt for Vice President ac-
cording to James A. Robinson, national
organizer of the party. The committee
is at 32 East Thirtieth street. Another
ticket which is receiving wide support,
Mr. Robinson said, is headed by
Surgeon General William C. C. Gorgas,
with Mark Fagan, formerly mayor of
Jersey City, for his running mate. The
nominations are to be decided at the
national convention of single taxers,
which will meet in Chicago on July 10,
12 and 13.

Mr. Robinson is hopeful that the
committee of forty-eight, which also is
to have a convention in Chicago
at the same time, would throw in the
lot with the single taxers and that the
two would form a third party with
"single tax" as the dominating issue in
the campaign.
"We expect to receive the support of
those who are disappointed at the con-
servative and reactionary stand of both
of the old parties," said Mr. Robinson.
"Our platform will be radical but in ac-
cordance with American ideals and in-
stitutions. The evils of profiteering
and the high cost of living are the
chief things that we are to deal with
through the adoption of the single
tax program advocated by Henry
George.
