

### SOLD THREE HERE IN N. J. ROBBERY

Carrying Suitcases, Arrested on Suspicion, May Be Wanted in Haddonfield

### ARTICLES LOOK LIKE LOOT

Three young men carrying suitcases were arrested on suspicion at 2:30 o'clock this morning at Franklin and Locust streets, and later sent to Central station to await identification and a hearing as men who robbed the general store of B. F. Fowler, at Haddonfield, Pa.

The men gave their names as Lewis Moran, twenty-seven, Summer street; Harry Cooper, nineteen, Franklin street near Spring Garden; and Charles Hickman, twenty-one, of the same address. They were arrested by Patrolmen Jeffries, Burt and Pisco, of the Tenth and Locust streets station. Examination of the suitcases disclosed that they were filled with new merchandise.

At the station house some time after the arrest a "flier" was received from Haddonfield telling of the robbery of the store and describing the goods stolen. As the material in the suitcases seemed to tally with that described in the "flier," the men were taken to the station, where Chief of Police Baxter, of Haddonfield, could appear against them.

The Fowler general store is one of the largest in Haddonfield. It is located at the corner of Ellis avenue and the King's Highway. Employees were working there until 11:30 o'clock last night.

When the store was opened this morning it was found that robbers had been there, having forced the rear door. They stole about \$500 worth of goods, mostly in low-priced watches and jewelry. About fifty watches were stolen, some stickpins and a quantity of men's furnishings. The robbers stole new suitcases in which to carry their plunder.

### WOMAN AUTOIST RELEASED

Will Be Given Further Hearing for Having Injured Man  
A woman driving a car which ran down and seriously injured a man at Germantown and Hunting Park avenues last night was released on her own recognizance at a hearing before Magistrate Wrigley today. She will be given a further hearing on July 22.

She is Mrs. Thomas F. Luce, forty-nine years old, of 219 South Fifty-first street. The man injured is Robert W. Van Stavoren, sixty-one years old, of Schwenksville, Pa.

At the hearing in the Germantown avenue and Locust street police station Mrs. Luce said she did not see the man until her machine struck him. He stepped past a trolley car directly into the path of the automobile, she testified.

Van Stavoren's left ear was torn off, several ribs fractured and his collarbone broken. He is undergoing treatment at St. Luke's Hospital.

### HELD IN N. J. MURDER

Coroner's Jury at Hammonton Decries Man for Grand Jury  
A verdict of willful murder at the hands of Joseph Santore, a returned overseas veteran, was found by a coroner's jury at Hammonton, N. J., last night in the case of Matteo Ingei, who was found dead with forty-five stab wounds in his body on Sunday, June 13. Santore is said to have confessed. He is held without bail to await the action of the grand jury. Eugene Larocca was held in \$3000 bail as a material witness. Mrs. Nean Rizzotte, near whose house the murder was committed and over whom the fight leading up to it is said to have been waged, was released on her own recognizance to appear as a witness when needed.

Fire in Building 146 N. Tenth Street  
Destruction of the four-story brick building at 146 North Tenth street was threatened by fire which broke out on the third floor last night. Thick smoke handicapped the firemen, who had to fight the blaze from a fire escape between

the blazing structure and the building at 144 North Tenth street. The fire is believed to have started in the shop of Krantz, Herach & Kushman, manufacturers of children's garments. The Industrial Upholstering Co. occupies the first floor and the Standard Costuming Co. the second.
