Zecca says the five men got \$38 from him, and the police declare he asked the house sergeant of the Fifteenth street and Snyder avenue station whether the news of the robbery would be in the evening papers.
"I suppose so, why?" returned the sergeant.
"I want my wife to see it," Zecca is said to have replied, nervously.
