

### 3 BOYS DROWNED; TRY RESCUE IN VAIN

Companions Dive, but Fail to Save Youth Lost in Stone Quarry Pool

### PARENTS WITNESS TRAGEDY

Three boys were drowned yesterday in and about the city, when they tried to avoid the intense heat of the day. The victims are: Edward Glazier, sixteen years old, Harrogate street and Nicetown lane, William Steinbender, sixteen years old, 1616 North Thirtieth street, Walter Grimley, eight years old, 337 Mechanic street, Camden, N. J., Glazier, who was employed at the plant of the American Engineering Co., with three fellow workers, asked the afternoon off to go swimming. Directly off the Northeast boulevard, near Cottman street, is an abandoned stone quarry, of a good size, with about thirty-five feet of water. Here the four youth enjoyed a long swim. Without warning, Glazier disappeared from view. His companions dived repeatedly in an effort to find the body of their friend, but in vain. The police were then notified, and they secured a rowboat and grappled for five hours in vain. Dynamiteing recovered, and the police believe that it was caught between some rocks. While his parents looked on, helpless to rescue him, young Steinbender drowned in Neshaminy creek yesterday afternoon. The family was about to leave, when William said he would take a swim to cool off. He was seized with cramps when he swam into a current of cold water coming from a spring in the creek, and went under before other bathers, hearing his cries, could reach him. The body was recovered. Young Grimley, with a group of companions, was waiting in the waters of

the Delaware river, off Mechanic street, Camden, when he stepped out too far, and was caught in an undercurrent. The police were notified, and for several hours dragged the waters near the accident before they succeeded in recovering the body.

### Boy Kicked by Horse

A nine-year-old boy, while playing on the sidewalk yesterday in Frankford, was kicked by a horse, suffering concussion of the brain. Albert Higham, 2083 Granite street, balancing himself as he walked along the curb, passed a horse tied to a pole, and as he did so fell, and the horse reared up in fright and kicked the boy in the head. He was taken to the Frankford Hospital in an unconscious condition.

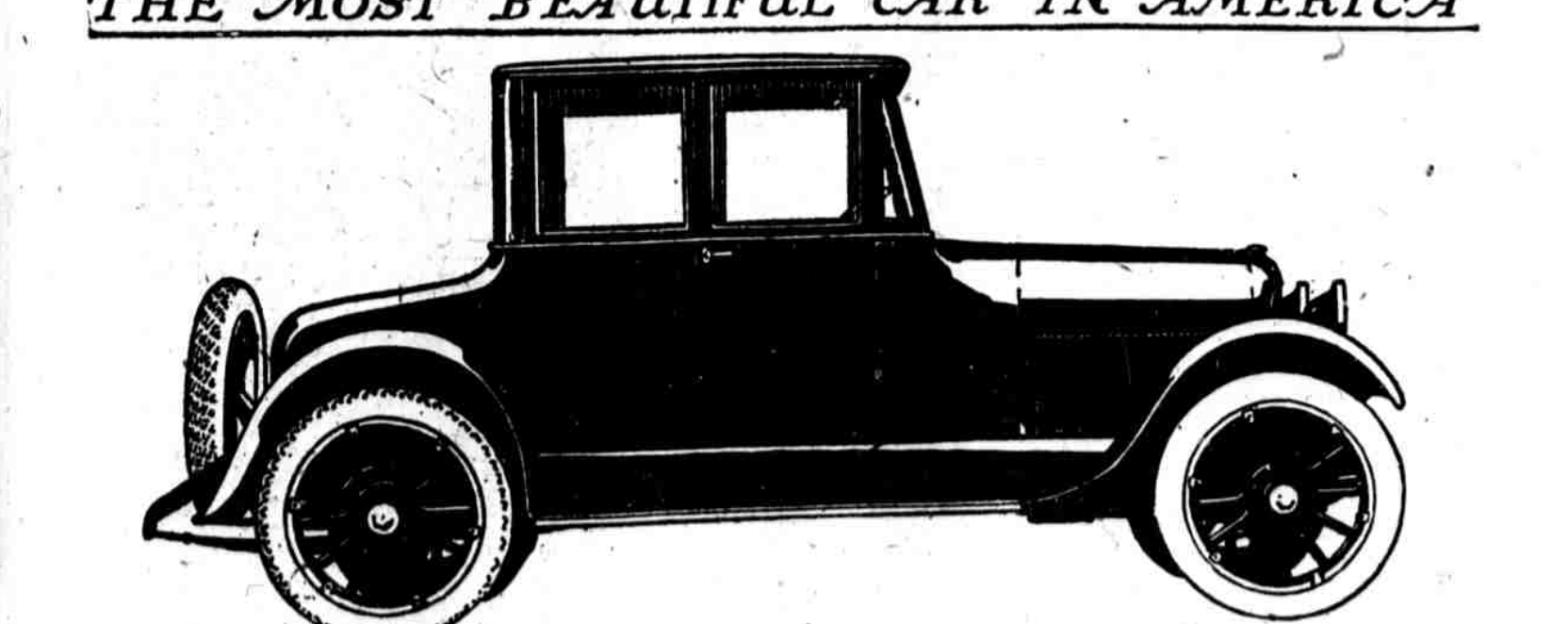
