

IN WRECK; WOMAN IS INJURED

Five P. R. R. Cars Derailed Near Lancaster, but Only One Passenger Is Hurt

SCENE OF CRASH SUNDAY

Five cars, four sleepers and one day coach, attached to the end of the Western express of the Pennsylvania Railroad, were derailed at Bird-in-Hand, about seven miles east of Lancaster, last night as the train sped toward Lancaster between sixty and sixty-five miles an hour.

Mrs. Catherine Weeling, Lewisville, Ind., was the only passenger injured. The train was composed of nine coaches. It carried, according to Pennsylvania Railroad officials, 245 passengers. Scores were shaken up when breaking air hoses jammed on the emergency brakes, stopping the speeding train within 300 yards of the scene of the accident.

A defective rail is believed to have caused the accident. It occurred at almost the same spot where fourteen cars of a freight train left the track Sunday morning.

Relief trains were formed here and were rushed to the scene. Doctors and nurses from this city were hurriedly gathered when first reports of the accident placed the number of dead between twenty-five and thirty. A train of thirty empty coaches, which followed the wrecked train west, was pressed into service to carry stranded passengers to their destinations.

Mother and Daughter Arrested
Mrs. Annie MacElfrick and her fifteen-year-old daughter, Mary, of Phoenixville, were arrested charged with stealing handbags, silk stockings and a doll from the counters of Market street stores. The girl was sent to the House of Detention. Her mother was held in \$500 bail for a further hearing by Magistrate Carson at City Hall. The mother pleaded for leniency, saying it was her first offense. She said she came to the city with her daughter to buy a rug. She had \$50 in her purse and asked to be allowed to settle for the stolen articles.

Doctor Green's Funeral Tomorrow
The funeral of Dr. Jesse Cope Green, who died in West Chester yesterday at the age of 102 years, will be held from his home at 109 West Gray street, West Chester, tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Doctor Green died as the direct result of a fall from a ladder, sustained about two weeks ago while hanging pictures in his home. He suffered internal injuries which, along with his age, caused his death.

NAVY TO SELL CHASERS

Speed Boats, Reduced in Price, Interest Yachtmen

Yachtmen throughout the country are interested in the sale of speedy submarine chasers at the navy yard, since the government has reduced the price of the boats.

The vessels are now being sold at \$14,000 apiece. They had been \$50,000. The craft are 110 feet long and are equipped with three 220-horsepower engines which enable them to travel at great speed. All the excellent seagoing boats, according to naval officers.

Three particularly fine subchasers have just arrived at the yard, according to Lieutenant Commander McKay, who is in charge of the sale. He says the boats are open for inspection.

U. S. AND CITY IN TANGLE

Government Wants Pay for Elmwood Section—Phila. Demands Taxes

A deadlock is developing between the city and the government in the matter of bills owed to each other. The government claims \$500,000 for sewers, water pipe, grading and paving in the Elmwood section, and a letter has just been received from the Emergency Fleet Corporation demanding payment. Assistant Director Joseph C. Wagner, of the Department of Public Works, characterized the letter as "very sharp."

Upon the other hand, the city claims \$225,000 in taxes from the government for police and fire protection, sewage disposal, ash and garbage collection, and so forth. The government has taken refuge in the principle that the government cannot be taxed, but the city contends it should pay these taxes in its capacity of owner and renter of houses. Also houses and other buildings have been erected in the beds of streets, without compensation to the city.

EMBARGOES RENEWED

Pennsylvania Railroad Uses War-Time Restrictions on Freight

War-time embargoes of freight other than food, livestock, coal and government shipments have been restored by the Pennsylvania Railroad in the Philadelphia district in order that strict control of car movements can be maintained during the present car shortage.

Under the embargoes, shipments can be made in and out of the city, but only by previously filing application for cars and specifying the use to which they will be put. These regulations, made possible by the recent order of the Interstate Commerce Commission restoring war-time regulations on account of the car shortage, are the same as those which were in effect during government control of railroads.

CAVALRY GOES THROUGH CITY

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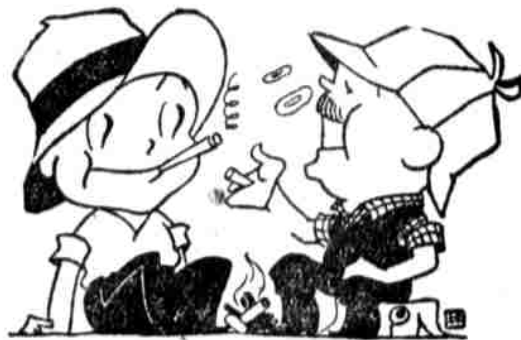

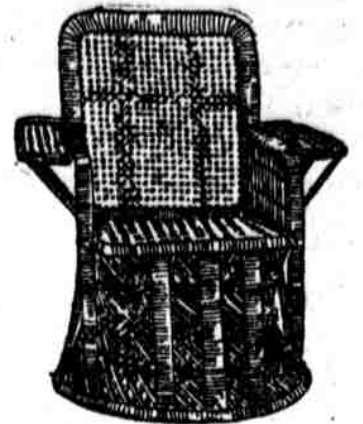

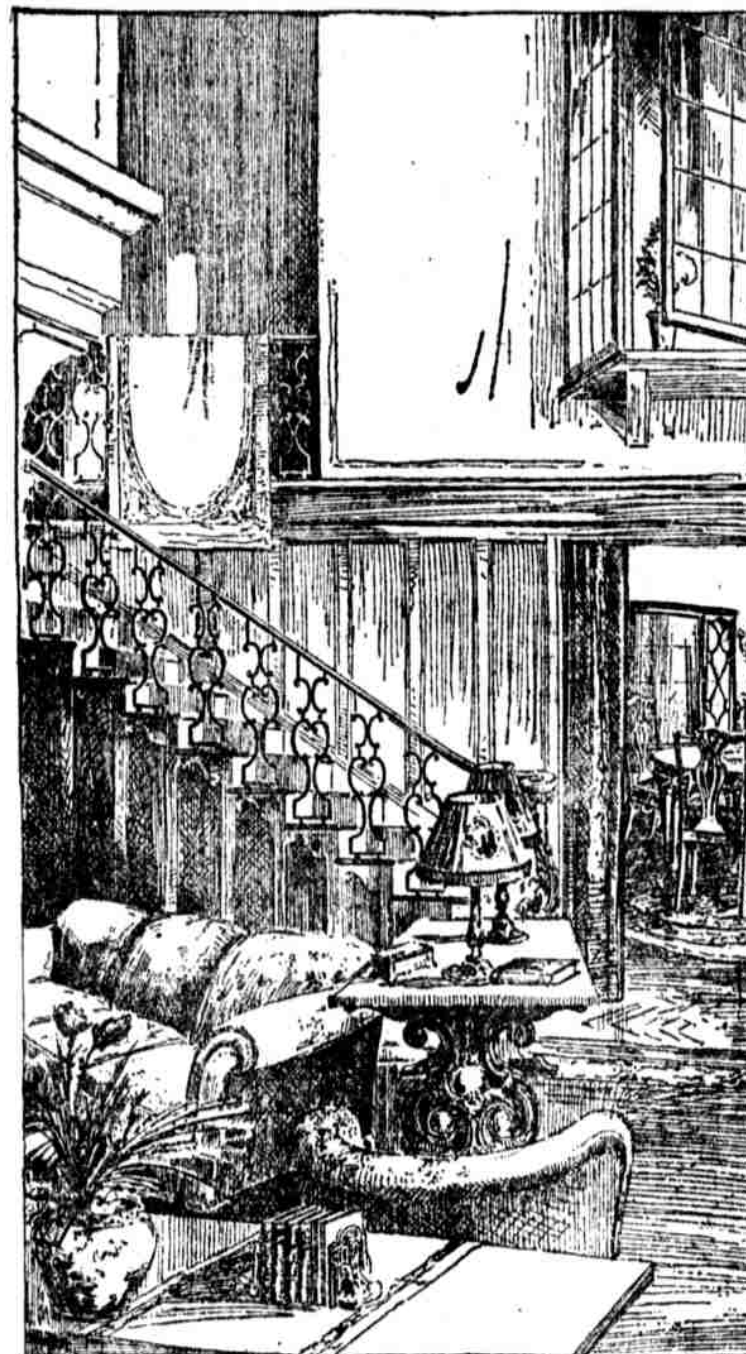
