Keeping Children Fit

To the Editor of the Evening Public Ledger:

Sir—A paragraph in "Short Cuts" recently gave a glimpse of results from a health survey of Kansas City school children. Ten per cent were underweight on first examination. Clinical and dental service were provided and pure food served and the children showed a gain of 278 per cent.

Your comment was "From which it would appear that not all the children needing our aid are in Europe. It may be that there are some right here in Philadelphia." Of 168 children weighed and measured the Philadelphia health council and

m the Philadelphia health council and tuberculosis committee's portable health clinics last week, 120 were found under-weight. Fourteen of them were from ten to twenty-five pounds below normal. Virtually every one of thirty-seven given rigid physical examination were found physically defective in some way.

The committee's physicians and nurses not only examine the children, but tell them how their defects and allments may be corrected. Nurses visit the parents to offer friendly ald and advice. Thus the parents learn what is the matter with their children and are taught simple and accessible means of keeping them physically and mentally fit. Cases needing immediate medical attention are referred to physicians begultale or disreferred to physicians, hospitals or dis-pensaries where proper treatment may

This work, in city recreation centers where clinical advantages hitherto were not available, has just begun. Fair results cannot be determined now. But even these first reports show that we need not go to Europe to seek children suffering from mahnutrition. Philadelphia has an alarming proportion of little ones who do not obtain the proper food, and these are not expecially children of ones who do not obtain the proper food, and these are not especially children of the poor. Carelessness, ignorance and the formation of bad eating habits, are given by physicians as causes. Mainutrition is indeed a menace, they claim, as it leads to mental and physical distilling

Periodic physical examination of chil-Periodic physical examination of children, the introduction of a definite health program in the public school curriculum. and nutrition classes available to all mothers and housewives are among the remedies suggested by the Philadelphia health council and tuberculosis committee.

I heartily indorse the sentiments he expresses, as he seems to grasp the situation in its proper light.

The section in which Mr. Roberis resides is one of the finest producing portions of the state; its products are largely of the perishable kind, and hence must be put on the market in season. regardless of what prices they bring.

The average farmer could hardly engage in profiteering, even if he was mean enough to do so, because of lack of organization or means. He does not set the prices for his products. The city fellows with whom he deals attend to that. Of course, being human, he takes all that he can get, but that is not saying that he should be made the goat in the war on profiteers. war on profiteers.

No doubt many of those who attempt to hold the farmer primarily responsible for the high cost of living, so far as farm produce is concerned, do not fully realize or take into consideration the enormous increase in the costs of production.

It is fair to presume that an immense majority of the American people recognize the inadequacy of the present tystem of distribution. But how to remedy it is a question astoundingly difficult to answer.






