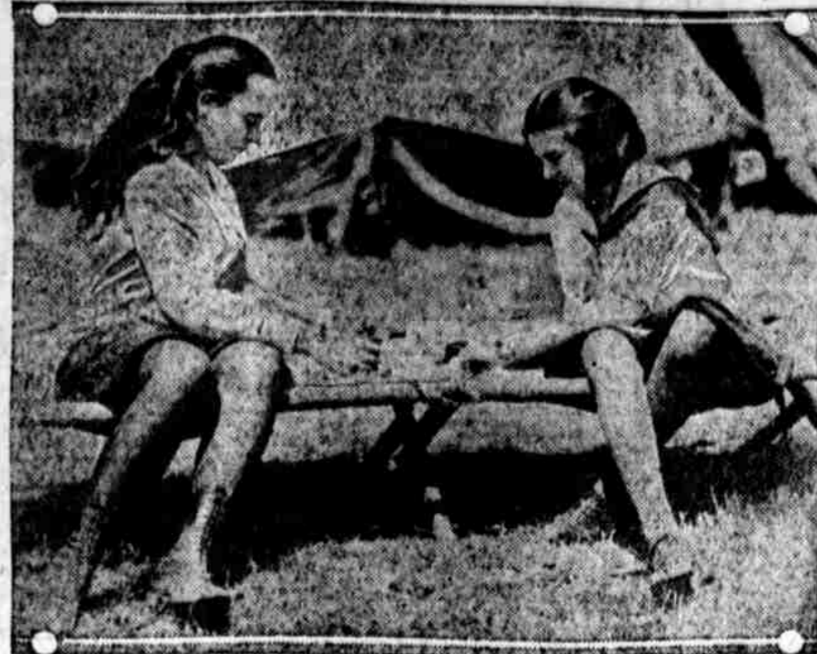

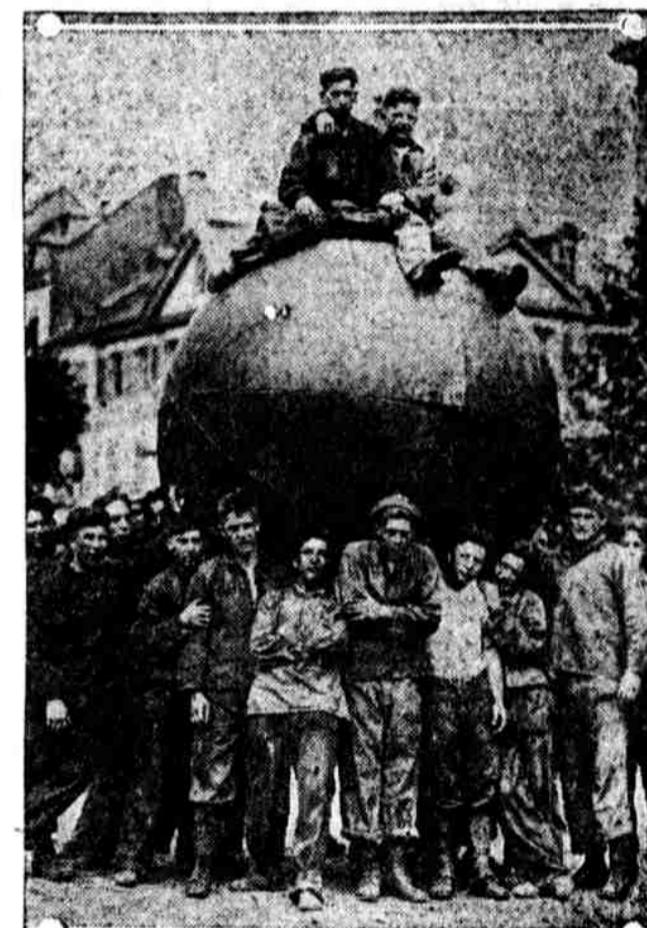

ROYAL POLO PLAYERS. King Alfonso of Spain (left) and Prince Henry of England, members of rival teams, were photographed at Roehampton, England.

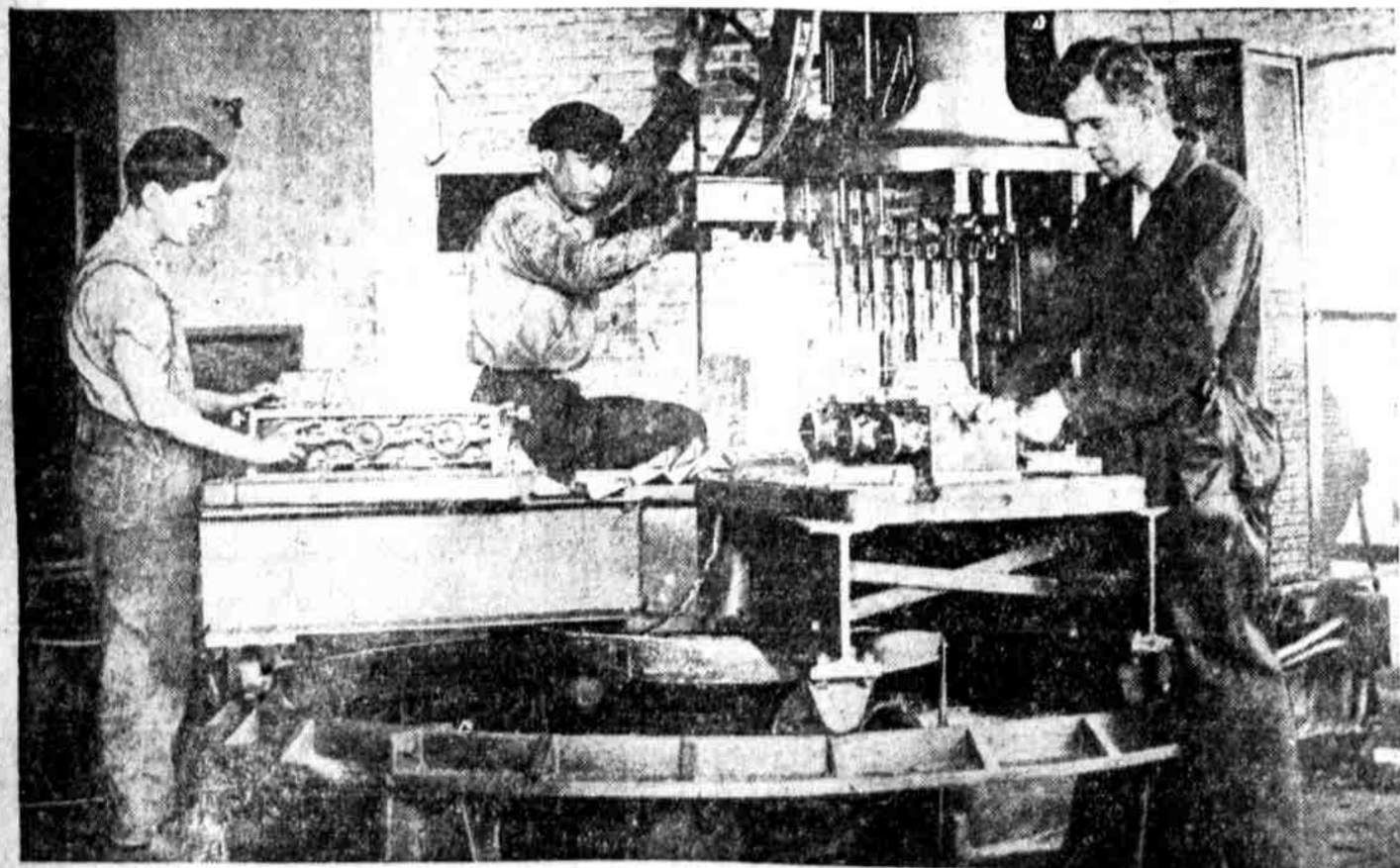
