Tommy Ryan, Bantam, Has Arrived, and McCann, Lightweight, and Mercer, Middleweight, Will Visit for Coming Season

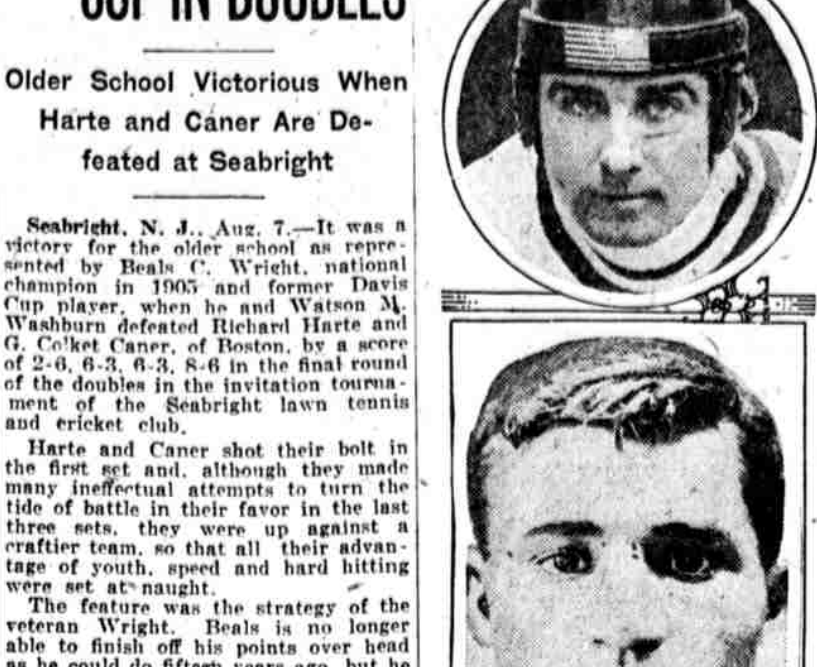
