LLOYD GEORGE DENOUNCED

Australian Catholics Demand Removal of Ban on Archbishop Mannix

Mannix of Australia, in England. Catholics were prominent in the pro-Mannix demonstrations, their speakers declaring the archbishop's treatment was a gross insult to the Catholic Church. Resolutions were adopted calling for removal of the ban on Archbishop Mannix's movements and will be sent to Premier Lloyd George and Edmond de Valera, "president of the Irish republic."

U. S. WARSHIPS ORDERED TO BALTIC

Washington, Aug. 16.—(By A. P.)—The armored cruiser Pittsburgh and a destroyer have been ordered on the Baltic sea to protect American interests there. The vessels are now at Cherbourg, France, and it was announced by the Navy Department that they would proceed immediately for Russian waters.

U. S. SHIP FOUNDERS OFF NEWPORT

STATE TO TEST NORTH CAROLINA POPLAR

HARRISBURG, Aug. 16.—Tests of planting of North Carolina poplars to furnish a new supply of pulp wood for Pennsylvania industries will be made upon an extensive scale in half a dozen counties under state auspices this fall. Trees have been selected and will be planted on state lands of different types. The growth and general condition will be checked up. Some planting of poplars also will be undertaken on farm lands.
