

DELAWARE G. O. P. FEUD LAID ASIDE Plate Selected and Way Paved for Harmony as Convention Opens

Dover, Del., Aug. 24.—Senator Harding today wired the Delaware Republican convention as follows: "Please convey my greetings to the Republicans of Delaware in connection with the opening of this important campaign it behooves us to do everything honorably possible to achieve election."

Custom spoke for the unanimous re-election of Representative Caleb H. Layton, but the Layton forces had defeated Governor John G. Townsend of the Delaware last spring and the Townsend forces breathed defiance and revenge. Layton's anti-school code stand hurt him, too.

It was all very dramatic and thrilling, but after much sober thought it was called off. The organization steam roller, painted and shining like a fire engine, is ready and waiting. When the whistle blows it will roll, and the organization slate is expected to go through.

Chairman Warner in opening the convention, said: "It seems vitally necessary to get our country back on an economic business basis and in support of pure American policies. The Republican party is the only force to get the country back on this right track at this time."

Senator Salus will head the lawers' committee which will call on Judge Ferguson today to ask him to authorize thirty new divisions. Ward committees will meet tonight to discuss the question.
