Miss Katzenstein Also Warns County Commissioners About Their Office Hours

First, that, despite the canvas made by assessors in the city last week, a number of suffrage leaders, including Miss Katzenstein, had not been put upon the list...

Secondly, that county commissioners do not arrive at their desks very promptly in the morning.

None of the commissioners was on hand when Miss Katzenstein arrived bright and early, and after waiting some time, she stated her case to one of the clerks...

Miss Katzenstein lives in the Netherlands Apartments, Forty-fourth and Chestnut streets, which is in the Forty-sixth ward. She stated that neither she nor her two sisters had been registered by the assessors...

After making arrangements to have the missing suffrage leaders added to the assessment list, Miss Katzenstein fired a parting shot, when she said that county officers would have to report for duty on time after women began to exercise their functions as voters.

JAPANESE PRINCESS IN FIRE Has Narrow Escape When Summer Resort is Burned

Tokio, Aug. 30.—(By A. P.)—Ikaio, Japan's famous summer resort located in the Ikaio mountains west of this city, was swept by fire yesterday, and about three-quarters of the town was destroyed...

Among the guests at Ikaio were nearly 3000 persons from Tokio, including many prominent people who were staying at villas and hotels. Some had narrow escapes, among them being Princess Higashikuni, sister of the Japanese emperor, whose husband accompanied the Japanese crown prince to France, and who is still in that country.

Baron Makino and Marquis Saioji, members of the Japanese delegation at the Versailles Peace Conference, also escaped in safety. Reports received here state that several persons were injured.
