

# SOLDIERS TO BURY GEN. CRESSWELL

### Military Funeral Here Planned for Commander of Pennsylvania Reserve

## A VICTIM OF APPENDICITIS

A military funeral is being planned here for Brigadier General Charles T. Cresswell, commander of the Pennsylvania reserve, who died yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Allegheny General Hospital, Pittsburgh, following an operation for appendicitis.

Mrs. Cresswell has gone to Pittsburgh to take charge of the body, which will be brought here for burial.

General Cresswell was stricken a week ago and was removed to the hospital last Sunday. He was visiting the home of George T. Greig, a long-time friend in Hutton road, Oakmont, when he became ill. General Cresswell is survived by his widow and two sons, one of whom is abroad.

General Cresswell was one of the most widely known officers in the old National Guard of Pennsylvania. Although an artist by profession he made the military life his hobby many years. He has not been in robust health for some time, however, and as early as June, 1916, the army doctors rejected him for service on the Mexican border.

That rejection happened on the eve of the departure of the Pennsylvania troops from Mt. Gretna, when he was colonel of the Third Regiment, N. G., P., a Philadelphia unit. He was then returning from an operation. The command thereupon passed to Colonel George E. Kemp, who held it through-out the Mexican and European engagements.

General Cresswell's home was at 2122 Locust street, and his studio at 10 South Eighteenth street. He was a member of the Art, Rittenhouse, University, Princeton, Philadelphia Country, Philadelphia Sketch and Philadelphia Barge Clubs.

His wife was Miss Belle C. Catherwood. General Cresswell was born in Philadelphia March 27, 1861, and was graduated from Princeton in 1880. He enlisted in the National Guard of Pennsylvania that year in the First Regiment and served three years, when he joined the First City Troop. He remained with that organization until February, 1890.

In January, 1898, he was made first lieutenant of Battery A and served until March of the following year, when he was made adjutant of the Third Regiment. He was elected major in 1904, lieutenant colonel in 1911 and succeeded Colonel Caldwell K. Biddle as commander of the regiment.

For many years General Cresswell wore a heavy mustache and his resemblance to the late Colonel Roosevelt was so striking that he was often called "Teddy's double."

# GIRL SWIMMING CHAMPION IS A TALENTED VIOLINIST

### Irene Guest, Who Took Second Place at Olympics, Expects to Make Music Her Life Profession

Irene Guest, who has just won second place in the 100-meter free style women's race at the Olympic games in Antwerp, is not only a champion swimmer, but one of the most talented young violinists in Philadelphia.

Her mother, Mrs. George C. Guest, 4400 Market street, says she has great hopes for her daughter's musical future.

"My husband and I have always placed great confidence in Irene's ability," said Mrs. Guest. "From the time she was a tiny tot we have endeavored to bring out only child up to be a healthy, intelligent woman."

"We never expected her to become a champion swimmer, but when she began winning medals a few years ago we gave her every possible training advantage, and her feat last Wednesday has shown me that my daughter has again accomplished what she set her mind to do."

"That is Irene's most prominent characteristic; when she decides to do anything she does it."

"Swimming is not the profession my daughter is planning to make her life's work. She is an exceptionally good musician and music is to be her forte in the years to come."

"She has frequently been a violin soloist at Matinee Musical Club concerts, and most of her time when she is not training for a swimming contest is taken up with orchestra engagements and lessons."

"Her teacher, Lucius Cole, wants her to remain in Antwerp and study under Caesar Thompson, the famous violinist. However, this is her first trip away from home and she feels that she is too young to remain away long this time."

"Neither Doctor Guest nor I will influence her regarding this matter. We have brought Irene up to depend on herself in everything, and such a decision is up to her."

"Oh, yes, I am proud of my daughter, and I am so confident of her in every way. She is a simple, unspoiled girl and this added triumph will not bring her home to me changed in any way. She has always been bright. In school she outstripped older girls in studying and graduated from the West Philadelphia Girls' High School before her seventeenth birthday."
