Military Funeral Here Planned for Commander of Pennsylvania Reserve

VICTIM OF APPENDICITIS

A military funeral is being planned here for Brigadier General Charles T. Cresswell, commander of the Pennsylvania reserve, who died yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the Allegheny General Hospital, Pittsburgh, following an operation for appendicitis,

Mrs. Cresswell has gone to Pitts burgh to take charge of the body, which

General Cresswell was stricken a week ago and was removed to the hospital last Sunday. He was visiting the home of George T. Gregg, a long-time friend in Hulton road, Oakment, when he became ill. General Cresswell is he became ill. General Cresswell is mrvived by his widow and two sons,

mrvived by his widow and two sons, one of whom is abroad.

General Cresswell was one of the most widely known officers in the old National Guard of Pennsylvania. Although an artist by profession he made the military life his hobby many the had not been in related. made the mintary life his hoody many years. He had not been in robust beath for some time however, and as early as June, 1916, the army doctors rejected him for service on the Mexi-

can border.

That rejection happened on the eve of the departure of the Pennsylvania troops from Mt. Gretna, when he was colonel of the Third Regiment, N. G. P. a Philadelphia unit. He was then recovering from an operation. The recovering thereupon passed to Colonel George E. Kemp, who held it throughout the Mexican and European engage-

General Cresswell's home was at 2122 Curled up in a porch chair several doors away from her brother's house. He enlisted in the National Guard of Pennsylvania that year in the First Regiment and served three years, when he joined the First City Troop. He remained with that organization until February, 1894.

In January, 1898, he was made first Heutenant of Battery A and served until March of the following year, when until March of the Thirdhe was made adjutant of the Thirdhe was made adjutant of the Thirdhe Regiment. He was elected major in 1904, lieutenant colonel in 1911 and succeeded Colonel Caldwell K. Biddle

as commander of the regiment. so commander of the regiment.

For many years General Cresswell wore a heavy mustache and his resemblance to the late Colonel Roosevelt was so striking that he was often called "Teddy's double."
