

D'OLIER TO RETIRE TO RANKS IN FEB.

Legion Commander Will Resume Membership in Ingersoll Post No. 174

PLAN CONVENTION TRIP

Franklin D'Olier, who has served for virtually a year as national commander of the American Legion, will become an active Philadelphia legionnaire next February.

The term of office of the national commander will end with the election of his successor at the convention in Cleveland, September 27, 28 and 29. Commander D'Olier will tour China and Japan when he retires from the position of national commander, and upon his return to this country will take up his Legion work with the Harry H. Ingersoll Post, No. 174, of this city, of which he is a member.

Pennsylvania's delegation to the Cleveland convention will consist of fifty-seven delegates and fifty-seven

alternates. Comrade Hudson, of the George F. Baer Post, No. 312, composed of Reading Railway Co. veterans, is endeavoring to arrange for a special train to carry the legionaries to Cleveland, giving them the advantage of an outing at Niagara Falls and Buffalo.

The question of accommodations for this pilgrimage will receive consideration at the meeting of the Philadelphia county committee, post commanders and adjutants in the Chamber of Commerce assembly room tomorrow night at 8 o'clock.

A program of fall and winter activities was planned last night by Herbert Warriner Post, No. 70, at 1118 Snyder avenue. This post is in command of Harrison M. Montgomery, and its county representative is Frank W. Melvin, the chairman of the First Legion district. It hopes to double its present membership.
