

THEFT OF BICYCLE STARTS STREET RIOT

Friends of Prisoner Attack Accuser and Police Are Forced to Use Clubs

MAGISTRATE MAKES ARREST

A riot which police had to quell with clubs occurred near Seventeenth and Wood streets last night following the arrest of Magistrate Carney of a man accused of stealing a bicycle. The charge was made by Louis Pokas, a junk dealer, who lives at 3940 16th Wood street. Pokas had chased William Kildary, twenty-four years old, Shamokin street near his bicycle. Kildary is said to have attacked Pokas, who called for help. The alleged attack occurred near the office of Magistrate Carney, who ran to aid the Magistrate. Carney arrested Pokas, who was taken to his office, where a hearing was staged immediately. Kildary was held in \$1500 bail for a further hearing on charges of assault on Pokas and of aggravated assault on Magistrate Carney. When Pokas was returning to his shop friends of Kildary are said to have surrounded him. He ran into a house opposite his shop while a crowd of several hundred assembled. Magistrate Carney telephoned for police and details from the Twentieth and Buttonwood streets and the Fifteenth and Vine streets stations responded. The police dispersed the crowd after checking a few heads with their nightsticks. Pokas was escorted to his shop, which he locked up and then was taken under police guard to a trolley car, which took him home. Magistrate Carney today declared that he would abandon a gang which he characterized as "the toughest in town," said to have been responsible for the riot. Hugh McConroy, of Seventeenth street above Race, was arrested this morning in front of the magistrate's office. He was given a hearing at which witnesses testified he was leader of the gang which attacked Pokas. Magistrate Carney held him in \$500 bail for a further hearing September 8.

TROLLEYS IN CRASH; SIX ARE INJURED

Filbert Street Car Runs Into Crosstown Vehicle at Fifteenth Street

Six persons were hurt, none seriously, when a trolley car, westbound on Filbert street, plunged into a southbound Fifteenth street car, showering passengers with broken glass. The accident occurred at 11:30 o'clock last night. The injured:
Mrs. James Holloves, fifty-eight years old, 6144 De Lancey street; face cut, arms bruised, front teeth loosened.

Mrs. Clara J. Nichols, eighty-one years old, 6144 De Lancey street; face and body bruised.
Mrs. William Fleischman, thirty-seven years old, 140 Coates street, Sharon Hill; bruises of body.
Margaret Anderson, six years old, 4926 Saybrook avenue; right knee bruised when passenger fell on her.
J. L. Steinsoper, fifty-two years old, Pittsburgh, right side bruised.
William F. Duffy, thirty-three years old, 1625 Summer street; shock.
All the injured were taken to the Hahnemann Hospital in the patrol of the Fifteenth and Vine streets station. They were passengers on the Fifteenth street trolley.

The car westbound on Filbert street was said to be behind time and was moving rapidly. The motorman said he did not see the other car until too late to stop. The impact made a jagged hole in one side of the Fifteenth street car, while the dashboard of the other was crushed. The motorman escaped injury.
Both cars were crowded and many passengers were standing in the aisles. A number of the men and women riders were returning home from theaters. The collision bowled over the straphangers and they piled up in a tangled heap on the floor. Women screamed and both women and men began fighting their way to the exits.
