

DOCTOR MUST PAY POLL TAX HIMSELF

Doctor's Action in Making Wife Furnish Her Own Money Upheld by Law

JUDGE SULZBERGER'S RULE

That a woman pay her own poll tax? This question has been brought to the attention of Mayor Moore, who referred yesterday with his wife, and refused to pay her poll tax of fifty cents.

Interesting legal information on this subject was furnished to the registration commissioners. They pointed out, a woman pay for her poll tax out of her pocketbook. Former Judge Sulzberger decided this in a notable case in 1917.

The case concerned an elector named William R. Wells, who appeared before registrars in the second division of the Second Ward and asked to be registered. Dr. Lawrence F. Flick, an elector of the ward, protested the registration of Mr. Wells on the ground that he had not paid his poll tax personally. Wells was registered despite the protest. The case was taken into Common Pleas Court. In his decision, Judge Sulzberger held that unless an elector pays his poll tax himself he could not be registered.

"It is conceivable," the jurist stated, "that interests might arise which would favor the swelling of such a register." Referring to registration lists, he said the actual number of voters registered by such means civic power might be increased.

To attain such an end persons of means might find it desirable and expedient to expend some thousands of dollars. By such means they might acquire the proper balance of power in various districts of city or state and give one faction an advantage over another. The intimate association of the tax question forbids any other conclusion than that the payment of it by another person than the taxpayer himself is an illegal payment of an election expense.

Just Out of Jail for Offense, is Held Again as Smashers Otto Goss, forty-six years old, of Wallace street near Seventeenth, threw a brick through the window of Abram's pawnshop, Thirteenth and Mt. Police say Goss has served fifteen years in the penitentiary, and that his last sentence, for window-breaking, expired a week ago. He was taken to the Tenth and Buttonwood streets station and will be given a hearing before Magistrate Carson today at Central Station.

ACCUSED OF KILLING BOY

Ohio Farmer Beat Three-Year-Old Child With Harness, is Charged DeBance, O., Sept. 3.—(By A. P.)—Accused of having beaten Arthur Gerald Bullock, three-year-old son of his housekeeper, Ida May Bullock, to death with a leather harness tug last July 8, Joshua Botkins, a Noble township farmer, went on trial here. The jury was completed late yesterday and taken to the scene of the alleged crime. Botkins is charged with first-degree murder. He is alleged to have held the child by the ankles while administering the beating, which resulted in the child's death before the arrival of physicians.
