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LIVING COST KEEPS CHILDREN AT WORK

Census Report Shows Increase in Number of School **Pupils Employed**

Several interesting points are brought ut in the school census report of the Bureau of Compulsory Education, that show the general trend of population and industrial and civic developments

within the last few years. The report shows that from 1913 to 919 the number of children employed in the city dropped from 21,658 to ing increase in higher school ment during the same period. according to Henry G. Gideon, di-rector of the bureau, indicates that parents were more and more striving to get their children a better educa-tion and were less inclined to have them

tion and were less inclined to have them go to work at an early age.

Indications also point to the fact, said Mr. Gideon, that the number of pupils employed during this year will reach nearly 12,000, the first time in years that the number has increased. This he attributes partially to the change in the industrial situation, and the continued high cost of living.

Nearly industrial plants are also Nearby industrial plants are also thought by Mr. Gideon to have attracted many pupils, who have been able to earn more money than usual.

Out-of-town industrial plants are Out-of-town industrial plants are also believed to have caused a shifting of the city's population. The housing situation and the desire of parents to better their living conditions are also given as causes for this shifting. A survey of the river wards, stated Mr. Gideon, showed that the number of pupils in schools in those sections had decreased materially. Palmer Will Have Round-up Di decreased materially.
