LIVING COST KEEPS CHILDREN AT WORK

Census Report Shows Increase in Number of School Pupils Employed. Several interesting points are brought out in the school census report of the Bureau of Compulsory Education, that show the general trend of population and industrial and civic developments within the last few years.

The report shows that from 1913 to 1919 the number of children employed in the city dropped from 21,653 to 11,364, while there was a corresponding increase in higher school enrollment during the same period. This, according to Henry G. Gleason, director of the bureau, indicates that parents were more and more desirous to get their children a better education and were less inclined to have them go to work at an early age.

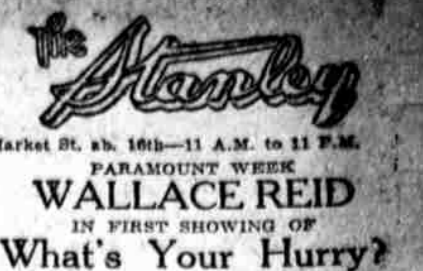
