

EX-SAILOR ARRESTED FOR MURDER OF GIRL

Confesses to Killing Baltimore Woman and Shooting Fiance In Attempted Hold-Up

Previdence, R. I., Sept. 9.—Charged with the murder of Rose V. McKenna on the Barrington parkway on the night of September 2, Rolf Adams, East Providence, was arrested last night. Adams, according to the police, confessed he fired the shots that killed Miss McKenna and wounded dangerously her fiance, William J. Deignan, as they were sitting in their automobile beside the roadway. He told the police that he did not know either Miss McKenna or Deignan. He said that he saw the car by the road and that, making his face with his handkerchief, he told the driver: "Hold up your mits!" Deignan, he said, made a movement as if he were going to pull a pistol. Adams quickly raised his .45-caliber automatic pistol and, holding it at a level with his eyes, pulled the trigger. Then Adams told the police he ran, carrying away his handkerchief and throwing the pistol into the street. He did not learn of Miss McKenna's death until the next morning. The police discovered the army handkerchief he had used for a mask tied with sailor knots. Adams is twenty-one years old and a former sailor in the United States navy. He is tall and thin, this corresponding with the description of the assailant given by Deignan. His record shows the accounts of the tragedy furnished to the police by Deignan, who is still in a serious condition at the Rhode Island Hospital, but who is expected by his physicians to recover. The lack of apparent motive for the crime had lent mystery to the killing.
