McGahan, were guests at the annual convention of the Department of New Jersey at Atlantic City. can Legion. Sixty-one posts in the state have recrived permanent charters, including five in Philadelphia: Kensington, Her-bert Warriner, William T. Shetzline, mert J. Martin and George H. Imhof

A big drive by members of Captain Walter M. Gearty Post has started with the hope of making its desired goal of 1000 paid-up members by December 1, when officers for 1921 will assume their luties. Every member in this post is paid up, and it is the general desire of he present membership to stop enrolling new members after the thousand mark has been renched. The post now has a membership of 789.


